**Add Vocational School
In September Curriculum**

**Details Heard at
Parent's Night**

In an address to parents of Grade 8 children, Tuesday night, Principal J. L. Lambert outlined the courses of study available at the High School. This year the new courses will be inaugurated one grade at a time beginning with Grade IX in September, 1962.

"The changes are to a great extent experimental," said the high school principal, "and the results will not appear for some time to come. I would urge you most strongly to think carefully before sending your child directly out of public school into vocational training. 'After all,' he continued, "general education is still the most important qualification our children can have."

He stated that narrowly trained adults find the hardest to retrain since their basis of knowledge is limited. He emphasized that the Technical and Commercial courses have a solid core of academic subjects.

In answer to a question from the audience, he said that it is hoped to serve the technical need of North Halton. However until they have a little more experience with the Occupational Class, this one will not be open to all comers.

There will be three main programs: the General Academic, the Commercial and the Technical. Each programme will be subdivided into a five year course and a four year course. Each five year course is designed to lead to University Matriculation. The four year course in the Academic programme will proceed at a somewhat slower pace than the five year course. It should lead to Junior Matriculation at the end of four years. A graduate of this course could complete Honour Matriculation requirements by spending a further two years in Senior classes.

The Technical and Commercial Courses are four year courses stressing the practical training as well as an academic background. Graduates of these courses may qualify for the Honour Matriculation by taking Grades XII and XIII.

**Inquest Recommends
Guides, Reflectors**

A coroner's jury has recommended that guide posts and white reflectors be installed at the dangerous curve on highway 7 of Norval where two men died on March 18th although the absence of them was not entirely blamed for the accident.

In Stewarttown hall Wednesday April 4th the inquest, conducted by Crown Attorney Peter Williams, drew out evidence indicating the excessive speed, and the lack of sleep all contributed to lack of stop all contributed to the accident, which took the lives of Douglas K. McEduards of Gravenhurst and Leonard Soper of Killmerby. The crash occurred at 3 a.m. when their car left the pavement of No. 7 highway on a curve, skidded along a ditch for some distance and ripped over, killing the occupants instantly.

**Seek Budget Cuts
From Local Boards**

In a last-ditch effort to keep the tax rate on an even local level, council's finance chairman Bob McNeilly summoned representatives of all boards and commissions which receive town grants to a discussion meeting Wednesday night.

"Council is going to have to make budget cuts and I hope other boards can too," was his comment which followed receipt of a \$305,000 budget from the public school board.

Cr. Harrison has been predicting a 7 mill tax rise this year, but so far no other council members have commented on the impending levy except for Cr. McNally who, during a debate on the assessment ratio amendment, was quoted as saying that unless the amendment was made, there would be no alternative but to raise taxes two mills.
