Bad. News... Good News

Last week's Hereld reported a mixture of bed and good news on its front page. It was with regret that we reported consistion of night school activities. For saveral years this has filled a prominent place . in the town's cultural and social life, teach-Ing skills ranging from dressmaking to welding, square dancing to typing. Hundreds of men and women have taken adventage of a budget-priced course which has made first-rate instruction available.

The school has for the present, taught Itself out of existence, literally. And while many will regret to see the doors close, it is not necessarily the end forever - five or ten years from now, a new generation will be eager, to learn to make metal trays, ecquire experience in oil painting, upholstering and smocking and there is no reason the school cannot be again formed.

But to counterbalance night school's

demise, along came an important day for the town when it was decided to introduce a YMCA-YWCA program in modified

·The Y' is too well known to have to expound on its merits.

And it is a happy day when this district comes into the Y fold with its citizenbuilding ideals. .

Coincidentally, there is every reason to believe that, while the night school organization could not interest enough people in enough variety of courses to make continuance worthwhile, the 'Y' could quite well adopt one or two of the desired projects and make the absence of night school less a blow to the town.

A committee is hard at work at present forming plans for the YMCA introduction and within three to six months, a program will be underway.

Has Our Idea Merit?

Two weeks ago the Herald made a suggestion that building land owned by Delrex Developments be released for building under the terms of the present subdivbion control and subdivision services bylaws, with the proviso that a penalty payment be assessed to release the Delrex firm from unfulfilled conditions in a 1954 agree ment signed with the town.

The suggestion was made after a great deal of thought, with the hope that both sides in a virtual political impasse might give a little, and that a start might be made on solving a problem which has caused more unfavourable publicity than anything else in Georgetown's long history.

The editorial caused some favourable reaction. Several ratepayers have mentioned it, and two councillors commented on it off the record.

But frankly, we have been disappointed that neither of the parties concerned, council or Delrex Developments, have indicated that they think there is any merit at all in the idea.

Last week council overcame one major stumbling block when a motion to amend the subdivision control bylaw was rescinded, and at the same time a decision taken

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
