## Hunter Rink Wins Sid Silver Shield

The curling fans for the Club Curling Championship Shield, donated by Sid Silver, were played on Thursday night. The four rinks in the finals were skipped by Ivan Hay and Oliver Hunter for the Monday and Thursday night draw and North Nelson and Stu Phillips for the Tuesday and Friday night draw. In the first game Hunter's rink eliminated Hay's rink and Phillips' rink eliminated the Nelson rink. The second game for the championship was a real battle between the Phillips and Hunter rinks.

Phillips took one on the first end. Hunter took one on the second end. Hunter picked up two on the third end and one on the fourth end. Phillips tied it up on the fifth. Hunter picked up two on the sixth and was laying a possible five when Phillips drew to the button and counted one. Hunter was one up coming home with the last rock on the last end. It looked as though Phillips had Hunter in trouble for a double take-out and he missed by only a half's breadth. Phillips had his vice out on a guard. McLaren could still see a piece of the shot rock and that was all he needed. His next rock curled in beautifully, to take the shot rock out and rolled over right in front of Phillips' second. Phillips tried to chip it out but missed. Hunter's first rock went right through the house. He said he didn't want it laying around. He preferred to keep the front open because he had last rock coming home. Phillips came up with his last rock. He got a piece of McLaren's rock and went out himself. The McLaren rock had a backer but was moved out just enough that it was only second. Phillips was laying shot on the other side. Hunter had last rock. Will he go for the

shot rock or draw for the button? He and his vice talked it over and Hunter preferred to draw, which he did with a perfect rock, eliminating the Phillips rink by two.

The members of the Oliver Hunter rink who won the championship shield are: Lead, Walter Nagorsen; second, John Karsenty; vice, Lyn McLaren; skip, Oliver Hunter.

The runners up and winners of the Schanley trophy rink were: Lead, H. Clarke; second, E. Daddrock; vice, Dick Hawes; skip, Stu Phillips.

The playdowns that lead up to the finals started on Monday evening with eight teams in the Monday-Thursday draw taking part. O. Hunter was victorious over the L. Crichton rink. E. Thompson was victorious over the M. Allison rink. E. Olsen won from S. Mackenzie and I. Hay won over the W. Bassett rink. In the nine o'clock draw the winners went right back on the ice again. Here are the results: O. Hunter sank the E. Thompson rink and the I. Hay rink emerged as winners over the E. Olsen rink. That left the Hunter and Hay rinks for the semi-finals on Thursday evening.

On Tuesday, the Tuesday-Thursday draw took over and here are the results: Two brothers led off the parade, Bill and Don Schenk, with Don emerging to continue on in the playdowns. S. Phillips was successful over the E. Clarke rink. Nels Robinson was the winner over the W. Heavry rink. Nort Nelson was the winner over Ken Howat. In the late draw over the final winners were Phillips over Don Schenk and Nort Nelson over Nels Robinson. This left Nelson and Phillips to battle it out on Thursday for the draw winner to advance to the finals.

## Can Shoot Dogs If Deer Molested

Recent incidents where deer have been chased into the path of cars or molested to death by a herd of vicious wild dogs, has led Malton Game Warden R. M. "Bob" Reid to issue a "declaration of war on dogs."

A former saw two dogs—a German Shepherd and a Collie—molested and kill a deer recently near the Beaver Dam in Managoway. He chased them, but they are still loose. Later, two deer were killed within 30 minutes of each other, both near Maltonville, by molesters who couldn't stop when the deer crossed the road in front of them. With molesters reported being chased the deer, and when the Game Warden arrived he could still hear the dogs barking in the bush.

**Saw Dog Chasing**

Again Tuesday morning of last week, a motorist who ran over a deer on the South Line near Maltonville told police he saw a dog chase the deer onto the road.

The Game and Fisheries Act states that no person owning, harboring or claiming to own a dog shall allow it to run at large during the closed season for deer. Mr. Reid pointed out. The Act says dogs found running deer during the closed season shall be deemed to be at large with leave of the owner, and may be killed on sight by an officer, without incurring any liability or penalty. If the dog can be traced to its owner, the owner is liable to a fine.

**Game Birds Too**

Mr. Reid also points out the Act forbids dogs from molesting or following the tracks of any wild game bird, or disturbing its nest between April and July.

"If your dog falls to return home, in all probability it won't," said the Game Warden. He and police officers are prepared to shoot any dog molesting the animals.
