Mechanical defects are sometimes the cause of accidents on our streets and highways."

"To gain the best performance out of your car - old or new - make certain that the following major points are checked at your local service station or garage:

- Adjust brakes; check brake drums and linings for excessive wear; see that fluid is at proper level in master cylinder.
- List, but not least, equip your car with seat belts for your safety and that of your family."
