

**Mathematical Basis  
For All Forms of Art**

She stressed the fact that no matter which of the arts you were interested in, there must be a basic plan to begin with. Her criticism of some modern artists was the fact that there apparently is no plan. An interesting fact she mentioned was the basis of art is mathematical, the spiral logarithm. One of the reasons for the change in art since the Victorian period is that painting was the only way people had of portraying anything visual consequently things had to be very detailed and exact and did not leave the artist any leeway for self expression. After the advent of photography the artist really came into his own as far as self expression was concerned. It was interesting to hear that at the time of the Coronation of Queen Victoria, which was prior to the coming of photography, that many artists were present painting the ceremony and that steel engravings were made from these pictures and after many months these were available for the public. Quite a comparison with the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth when everyone could see the ceremony practically as it was taking place. In closing Miss Stone quoted a poem, the theme of which is that we cannot live by bread alone, but must have beauty as well. Mrs. W. Rigg thanked Miss Stone and presented her with a gift from the members. The meeting closed with the Club Benediction.

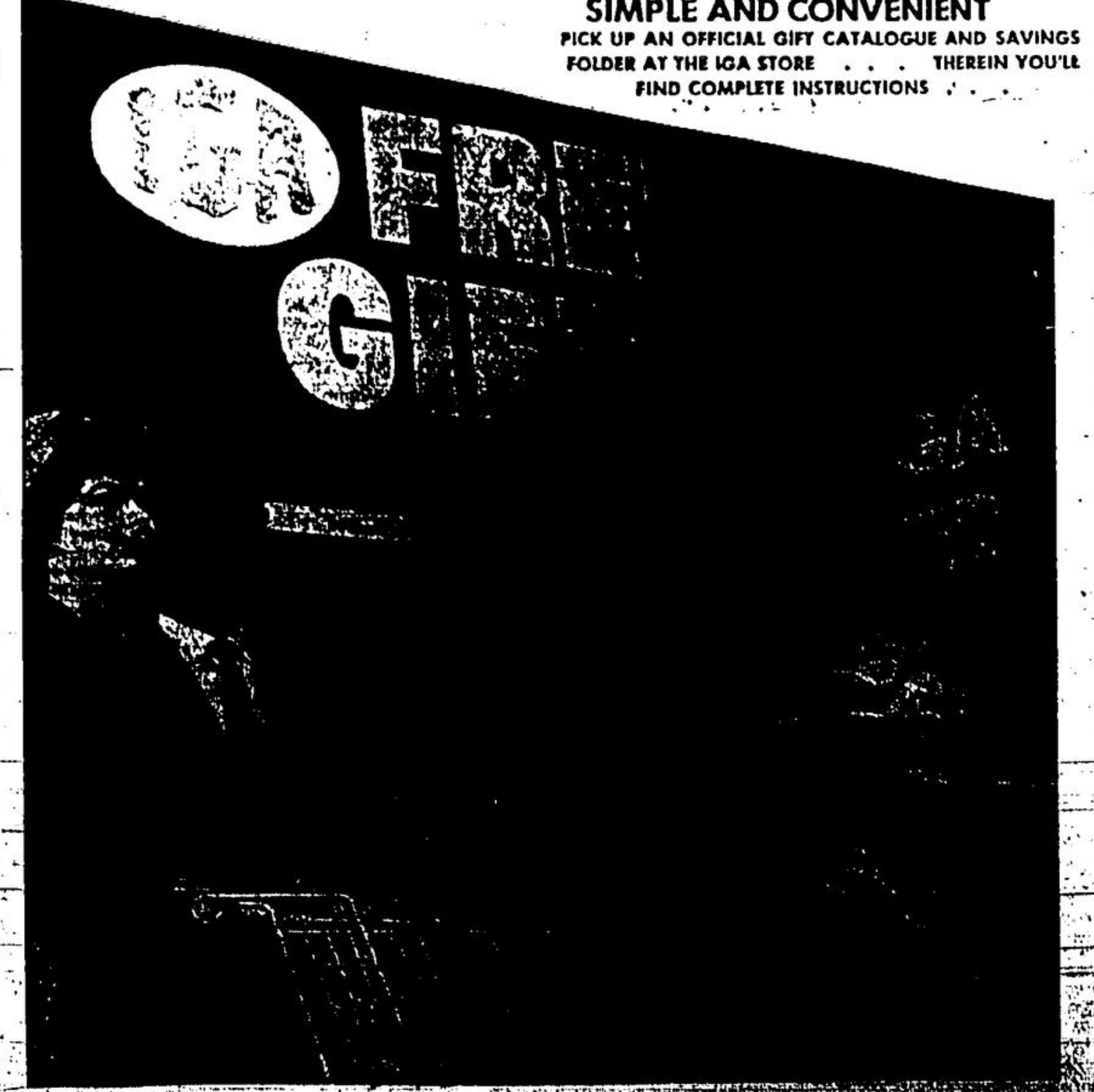
