## Sunshine School Will Get \$4050 from County

As a result of a by-law passed last week at Halton county council, Retarded Children's Schools will benefit by grants of \$1.50 per square foot, of new building. In the case of the school on the 7th Line, near Hornby, where cement footings are now being poured, this will mean a county grant of \$4,050 on the four roomed school. In order to receive the grant, the Association must give the county evidence that it has collected 80% of the tendered construction costs, and Dept. of Education approval.

### Town Man Judge At Dance Contest

The by-law setting the County levy of six mills was passed last week in Milton. A total County assessment of \$222,452.518, on a 6 mill rate, will raise \$1,438,992. Georgetown's total share is \$122,424, while the two largest towns in Halton, Oakville and Burlington, will pay the lion's share of the County cost. Burlington's share is \$531,796 and Oakville's is \$389,822, leaving \$320,122 to be divided among Acton, Milton, Mississauga, Markham, and Georgetown.

Council also approved a meeting between the solicitors of the County and towns of Oakville and Burlington, to study the towns' request for increased voting power on County Council.

At a future County Council meeting, members may well turn up lunchless, since the Emergency Measures Organization has promised to serve them a meal from the Emergency Feeding Kit which will be delivered shortly.
