

# Would Have Rouleau Concede to Liberals

Frederick M. Fenton, Oakville lawyer, has invited Carl Rouleau, NDP candidate in the forthcoming Federal balloting to withdraw in favour of Dr. Harry Harley, Liberal candidate in Halton county.

In a letter to Mr. Rouleau, released to the press, Mr. Fenton wrote:

"Past statistics and present indications prove that in the Halton County riding the prospective New Democratic Party candidate will poll only about 10 percent of the votes cast in the next general election on June 18th, 1962.

"In the election of 1957 the CCF party polled 11 per cent (3,344) of the votes cast. One year later, in the 1958 election, the CCF party polled only 10 per cent (3,481) of the vote cast. Since then the CCF has been reconstituted and renamed with the objective of making its appeal as a Party wider, and strengthening its financial base. Neither of these objectives has been attained — the New Democratic Party does not even have the support of all the unions in this county. Obviously then, the New Democratic Party candidate could not win this riding for his party in the coming Federal election.

"In view of this it would, in my humble opinion, be wise to you, Mr. Rouleau, to withdraw as a candidate in the coming election, and for the new members of the New Democratic Party to get behind, support, and vote for Dr. Harry Harley, the Liberal Party nominee. Such a course would be wise because:

# Work in India Is Told By Bishop

Rev. C. E. Wilkinson, M.A. D.D., assistant Bishop of the Diocese of Niagara, was guest speaker at the St. George's Day dinner held in the Parish Hall of St. George's Anglican Church on Monday evening, April 23rd.

Introduced by the Rector, Rev. J. H. McMulkin, Dr. Wilkinson illustrated his talk on the work of the church in India with colour slides. Dr. Wilkinson was able to give his listeners some vital first-hand impressions, since for many years he was the Bishop of the Indian diocese of Amritsar, which is in the Punjab area of India. During his incumbency, Dr. Wilkinson's goal was to build up the Anglican church of India to the point where it was self-supporting and self-governing.

The work and influence of the missionaries reached out into every area of the Indians' lives, to help improve their living conditions and education and health standards, in addition to the most important work of helping them become Christians. In teaching Christianity, there is a direct challenge to all engaged in mission work to live the Christian faith every minute of every day, so that by their lives they can inspire others.

Dr. Wilkinson emphasized that the mission work of the church is a work in which we all can and do share. He showed pictures of many churches and schools which Canadian mission funds have helped finance. The work there is almost endless, and without the support of the people at home, nothing can be accomplished.

Jack Armstrong thanked Dr. Wilkinson for coming to speak. Proceeds from the roast beef dinner, which was arranged, prepared, and served with the cooperation of all church organizations, will be donated to the mission work of the church.

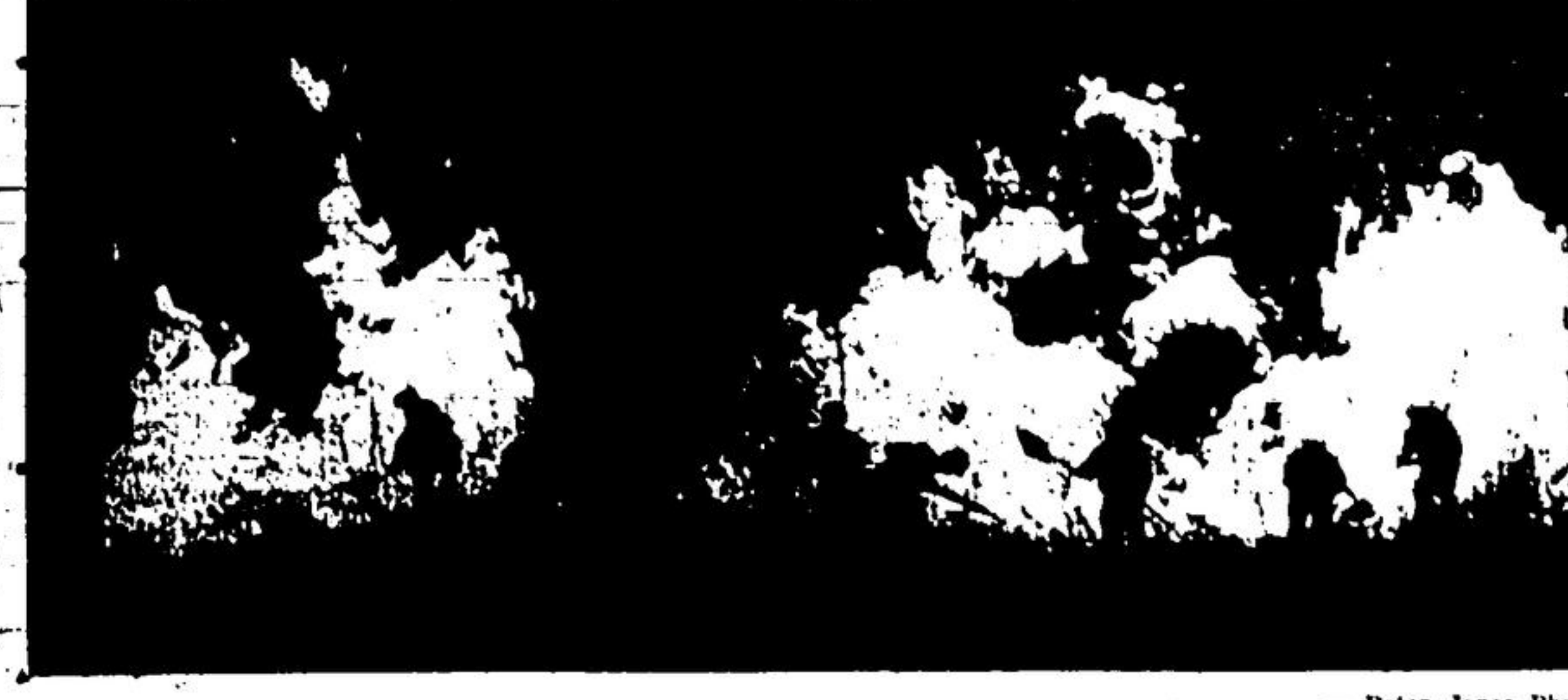
Duties of a municipal head are varied, and one of the extra activities for Mayor Doug Sargent this year will be to pitch the first ball at
