Trout Restocking Scheme for Credit

The lower paper will dam the magnet for local and district trout seekers, may be going to status as "the place to go for whoppers."

The Georgetown Anglers and Hunters have discussed they will be restocking that section of the Credit River with trout in cooperation with the Dept. of Lands and Forests. The five mile stretch to be stocked is between the dam and county boundary. Some 500 Speckles will be dumped into three locations along the river and the public, young and old alike, will welcome the change of trying their luck again in an area that was so popular it was "fished out" several years ago, although ardent spinners still occasionally take a good sized Brown out of those waters.

The club has also undertaken to conduct a survey of all fish caught in the area of the restocking and future programs of restocking will depend on the results. The club has asked for the cooperation of all anglers in the survey. Call Fred Darby at T. 7-4957 or write him at 49 Raylawn Cres., Georgetown.

In the past fishermen have had equal success in the Credit with bait casting, spin fishing, or fly casting with baits ranging from worms a flies. The restocking will take place next month.

Illegal Jacklighting Spoils Hunting for Sportsmen

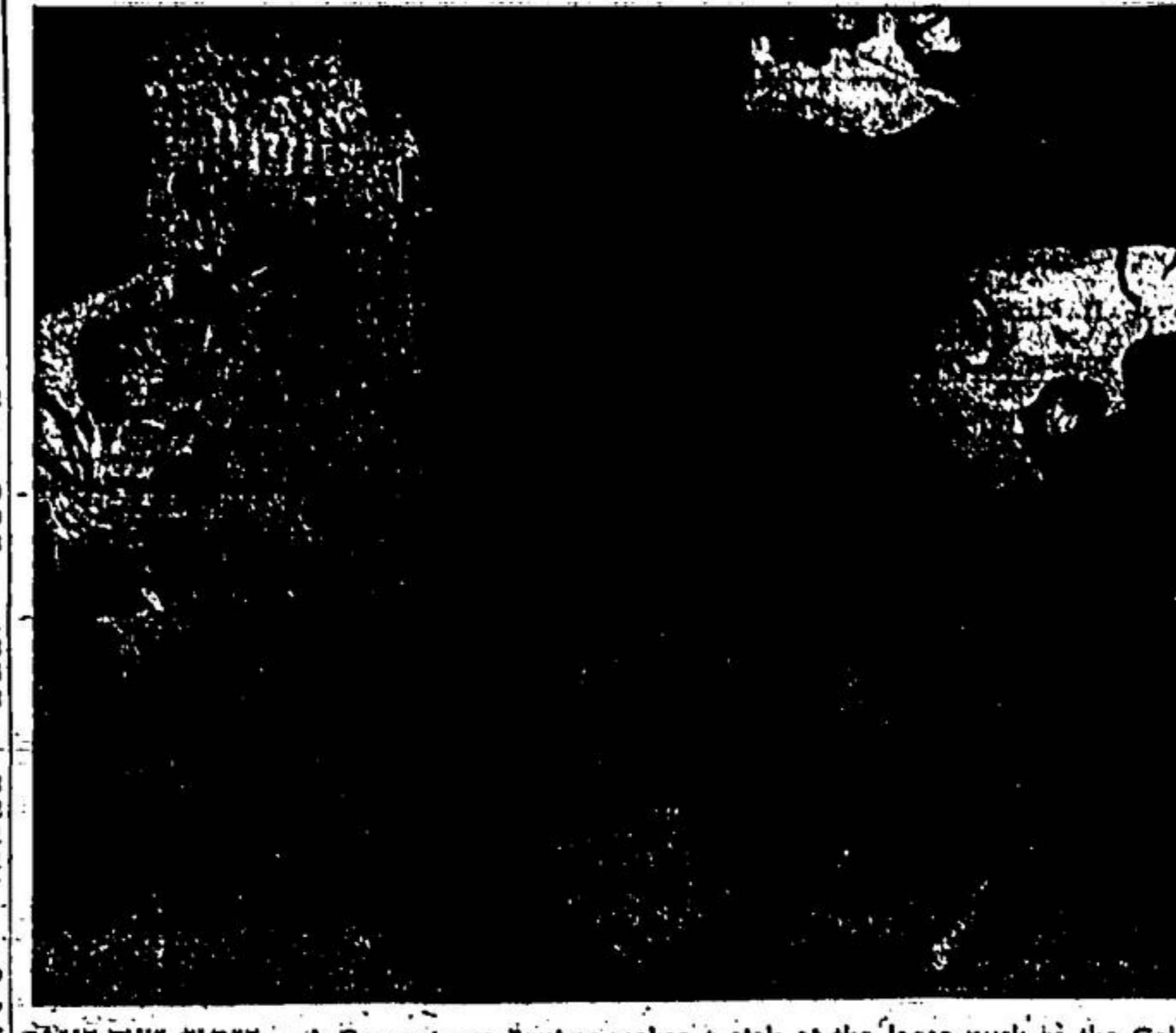
Jacklighting, the illegal practice of petrifying deer at night with a high powered lamp and shooting them while they stand hypnotized is going on all the time in Halton county, according to game warden Bob Reid.

He said his department does all they can to nab the culprits, but it's next to impossible to be in the right place at the right time. He depends on farmers to call him whenever they hear shooting after dark and conducts regular patrols of the back roads.

No Sympathy
Most sportsmen have no sympathy for the poacher or jacklighter who fishes or hunts out of season. By illegally killing off Canada's game they're acting more like a criminal than the man who breaks a criminal law, and they're spoiling the sport for themselves and all the good anglers and hunters.

Pseudo-sportsmen who kill game any time they feel like it, either don't realize that the regulations have been set to maintain a balance of nature or are just plain ignorant. Members of hunting clubs and other genuine sportsmen don't hesitate to report them.
