**Veto Chairman Checking Before Renting Equipment for Town**

Legislation which would have required the town works superintendent to check with a committee chairman before renting equipment in many cases was turned down Monday on a 5-4 split council vote.

Recently council advertised for rental tenders for various forms of equipment, and decided to hire the machine for each job which could do the job most economically. But there is a difference of opinion among councillors about interpretation of this rule.

"The cheapest per hour machine is not necessarily the one which will do the job for the lowest total price," says read chairman Fred Harrison. Deputy Reeve Hunter and Reeve Elliott were supported by Cr. Zimmerman and Barra in their stand that unless the cheapest per hour machine is to be hired, the works department should check with the appropriate chairman for an okay.

"This puts the onus on the chairman and clarifies the superintendent's position," said Cr. Barrager in supporting the motion.

"Penny wise and pound foolish," said Mayor Sargent in opposing the move.

The mayor said equipment has to be secured sometimes on short notice, and the superintendent's hands should not be tied. However, he agreed that a chairman should be informed when a higher per hour machine is used.

"I don't know the difference between a backhoe and a bulldozer," opined Cr. Rex Cock. "We seem to be developing into an engineering board rather than a council. If the superintendent isn't doing his job properly, let's put a motion on the table to fire him."

Cr. Harrison said council should trust the superintendent to make the best choice of machines without tying his hands. "I'm interested in the money spent by my water committee. If you want to spend more money in your committees, go ahead," snapped Deputy Reeve Hunter angrily.

"Too restrictive," was Cr. Brown's opinion. Cr. McNeilly said there had been reflection on the superintendent and wanted the motion withdrawn to give him an opportunity to explain, but his request was not granted. He then asked for a recorded vote, which ended in the 5-4 turnout.

**Indicate Zoning Will Be Altered for Garage**

A sympathetic hearing on a zoning problem was given by a majority of councillors Monday.

Solicitor Terry Baines appeared for Shell Oil Co. and Franklin Prouse, asking that the Prouse car firm be allowed to move into a garage at Edward St. and the Highway and continue to use part of the building as a showroom.

The premises had been altered last year by the present tenant, he said, who converted a restaurant into the showroom. The area is zoned C1 and allows service stations but not car showrooms.

Council had discussed changing to a C2 area last year, Cr. Barrager said, but had never finalized any plan.

"I strongly support it as C2," he said. Cr. Harrison was of a similar opinion. Originally zoning had been adopted to establish a general policy, subject to changes when needed, he said. The service station had been there prior to any houses and he thinks C2 is the correct one for the area.

Damp weather is putting the check on the grassy lawns.

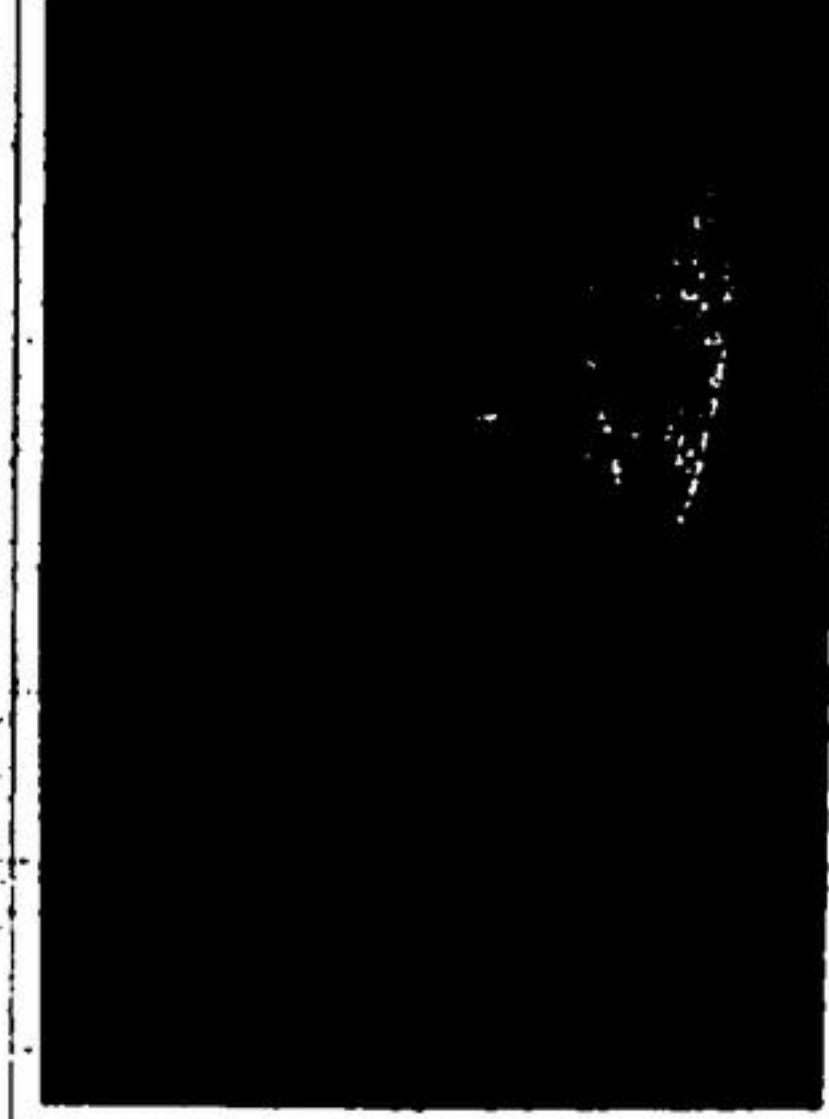
Locally firemen have answered only 5 fire calls since last Thursday, all of them grass, but none of the serious. One fire ignited on the Haslop property on the east side of the 8th Line spread to the Saxe farm and consumed a small barn which was empty at the time. Firemen had to come from battling another fire near Yerra Cotta to do so.

Saturday heavy winds threatened to whip a blaze on the old Cromar farm on No. 15 Sideroad, across extensive acreage, but firemen were able to bring it under control before any damage had been done.

Two plans Sunday summoned the department to burning grass on the 7th Line and another on the 9th Line. The latter, on top of Glen mountain near Argo Black got into the trees and smoke was visible for some distance.

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**Heavy Demand Today For Blood Donations**

Why is the Red Cross always in need of new blood donors? With the start of a new year construction of additional hospital facilities and advances in medical technology will continue to place heavier demands on our blood donor recruitment programme. It becomes increasingly important for all communities to reach their clinic objectives if hospital patients are supplied with blood transfusions when needed. In general, only healthy volunteers between the ages of 18 and 65 can be accepted as blood donors.

For the mutual protection of both the donor and the recipient of the donation, the following medical reasons are causes for the exclusion of donors:

- History of Malaria within the past 12 months. If Malaria was suffered over one year ago, blood may be taken and used for plasma fractions.
- A history of infectious hepatitis or serum homologous jaundice is always a cause for rejection.
- A haemoglobin value of less than 12.5 G. (185%).
- Too frequent donations. Donors cannot be accepted more often than once in every three months.
- Certain chronic illnesses such as Cancer, Diabetes, Tuberculosis, Epilepsy (fits or fainting spells), Undulant or any prolonged fever if active, Peptic Ulcer, and most cases of Heart Disease or Kidney Disease.
- Hypertension without obvious renal or cardiac involvement may be accepted if there has been a previous agreement between the donor's physician and the Medical Director.
- Any illness which has required hospitalization in the last six months is usually a cause for exclusion.
- Any illness which has necessitated a physician's care in the last three months may be a cause for rejection. The Senior Nurse must use her discretion in accepting donors with such a history.
- During pregnancy and for six months after the birth of the baby, except in the case of "serum donors".
- Colds, flu, "flu", within the past week, particularly if antibiotics have been taken.
- Active allergy, such as asthma or hay fever, at the present time.
- No person under 100 lbs. body weight should donate more than 250 ml. of blood.
- Certain skin diseases are acceptable if they are not severe and the site of venipuncture is unaffected.
- Inoculation with smallpox or T.A.B.T.D. vaccine within two weeks. Other inoculations, including that of Salk vaccine, are not considered cause for exclusion.

**Lorne Scots Pipers Injured in Accident**

Two members of the Lorne Scots Pipers were taken to the Oakville Trafalgar hospital following a head-on collision last Saturday. The accident occurred on the Seventh Line between the Queen Elizabeth Way and Hwy. 401.

Injured were Pipe Major Joseph Sellors and Sgt. James Conn, both of Brampton. Sgt. Conn suffered a fractured skull and his condition is listed as critical. Major Sellors sustained injuries to his arms and ribs and a broken ankle. He is reported improving.

Police say a northbound vehicle, driven by Mrs. Margaret Roche of Port Credit, went out of control and shot into the southbound lane, striking the car occupied by Sellors and Conn. Mrs. Roche suffered a dislocated hip and a fractured arm and is presently in the Oakville hospital.

Police have not as yet determined the cause of the accident, but suspect the cause is a mechanical failure in the Roche automobile.

**HEALTH PLAN**

Oakville: The establishment of a National Health Plan by the Conservative Government during the next session of Parliament was forecast today by Halton MP Alexander (Sandy) Best.

During an interview, Mr. Best said that all indications are that a comprehensive Health Plan that will provide adequate medical coverage for all Canadians will follow immediately after recommendations of the Royal Commission on Health Services are known.

The Commission, under the leadership of Chief Justice Emmett Hall of Saskatchewan, is expected to report its findings early this Fall.

The Commission is known to have given considerable study to existing insurance Health Plans, and how they can best be fitted into a National Health Plan.

Mr. Best noted that it is improper for the Government to reveal any of the details of the proposed Health Plan while the Royal Commission is sitting. He said, however, that the Plan, when introduced by his Government, will contain no element of coercion to either doctors or patients.

Mr. Best referred to the outstanding success of the Conservative Government's Hospital Insurance Plan, now in operation in Canada, and said that the National Health Plan will be equally effective.

The plan, he concluded, will be in keeping with the more than doubled hospital construction grants introduced by the Conservative Government since it took office in 1957.
