# Crop Demonstrations Benefit To Farmers

During the past week the Halton Soil & Crop Improvement Association, in cooperation with farmers in Halton, has been setting out crop demonstrations. The purpose of these demonstrations is to outline improved cropping techniques. This program is carried out by the Association in cooperation with the Extension Branch, Ontario Department of Agriculture, and the Soil and Field Husbandry Department of the Ontario Agricultural College.

In order to obtain more useful results, the Halton Soil & Crop Improvement Association is co-operating with Associations in Peel, Wentworth, and Lincoln counties. Included in the demonstration program are projects to demonstrate the value of soil testing, in applying commercial fertilizers.

Other programs include weed control demonstrations, pasture management, and crop management. Pasture management is one of the most important facets of livestock production in Halton County. To focus attention on this, the association is now accepting entries in a Pasture Management Competition. Information on this program is available from the Extension Branch, Ontario Department of Agriculture, Milton.
