# Georgetown High School 4-School Meet Winners

## Pile Up 210 Points At Guelph on Saturday

Despite a new handicapping system which placed a double burden on Georgetown High School athletes, the local track and field team covering themselves with glory again Saturday as they rewrote standing records, copped division championships and sprinted off with the District 6 secondary school track and field meet title. GHS athletes stacked 210 points in earning the laurels for the second year in succession. The Acton team was second, well back with 156 points, despite the fact that they received 1 1/2 points to Georgetown's 1 in the scoring, and Erin, with a 2 to 1 advantage finished third. The Milton contingent trailed.

The meet was held at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, the same surroundings in which the Georgetown team will vie this weekend for the CWOSSA title with about 600 contestants representing other schools.

But more than their success first as expected, but was displaced by a pacer for the last lap. The win was awarded the 2nd place finisher, a GHS team member, and the 3rd man, another Georgetown runner, was mandated admiration. Figures of course placed second. Georgetown did not need the qualification rule to take other track events. They topped both girls and boys 440, and both open relays.

Girls Show Way Betty Quackenbush was the meet Intermediate Champ, and Caroline Norton, runner-up. Jennifer Mills was Junior Champ and Pat MacKinnon, runner-up, and Kathy Aspdren, picked up the Bantam title. Acton had practically begged to be included in this schedule Division and Pam Currie was since they had tracksters practicing at that distance. An Acton runner broke the tape an Intermediate.

## Zoning Changes For Highway Properties

Two changes in zoning, recommended by the Planning Board, received council approval Monday. A highway stretch from Maple Ave. to Reayway on the west side was rezoned from Commercial 1 to Commercial 2, which allows a broader classification of businesses. The change came about when Franklin Proulx asked Council last week for clarification of a garage building into which he is moving at the corner of Edward and Guelph. A car showroom is now allowed under the C-2 classification. A property owned by Art Scott encompassing a triangle bounded by the highway and Mountainview Rd. where a Pina station is located was rezoned from M-1 to C-2 at the same time.

## Drainage Ditch is Not Health Hazard

Last week a ratepayer, Jack Critchlow asked council for action in clearing a drainage ditch behind Raylawn Crescent which he termed a health and accident hazard. The ditch is on private property and council asked the county health unit to check and draw the complaint to the attention of Delrex Developments, which owns the property.

On Monday, council correspondence contained a letter from the Delrex firm which pointed out that the health unit finds no health hazard and that debris in the ditch is not of the company's making. The firm offered to grant access to residents to gather up debris for garbage pick-up. "Does the health unit absolve danger to children?" asked Cr. McNeilly. "If the ditch is kept clean it will keep itself drained," replied Cr. Harrison.

Reeve Elliott said the Jaycees might be planning a spring clean-up campaign, and might be interested in this as a project. The matter was turned over to the reeve's welfare committee to see that some action be taken.
