

## Parishioners Present Gifts to New Priest

A Georgetown man will be ordained an Anglican priest this Sunday.

Horace Lambie, 39 Stevens Crescent, is one of three graduates of a Toronto diocesan training school who will join the priesthood at an 11 a.m. service in St. Christopher's, Georgetown. He is a member of the first graduating class in a three-year course for ordinands which the church inaugurated three years ago.

For the first two years, he combined his daily employment as a cost estimator at the Walton Avro plant with evening lectures. And for the past year he has studied full time.

A native of Bristol, England, Mr. Lambie felt the call to the ministry in his early teens. But there was a stumbling block. He had left school at 14 to apprentice in an engineering firm and lacked the secondary education necessary. Despite night school studies he never quite reached his goal.

And it was after coming to Canada in 1951, marrying and

becoming the father of Charles, now 4, that again he tackled the difficult job of working and studying towards his chosen goal.

He will be assistant at the Church of the Redeemer, Stoney Creek.

Last Sunday, parishioners of St. George's honoured him at a coffee hour following the morning church service. Churchwarden Charles Harris presented a private communion set as a gift from the parish. He has led the boys' choir for some time and Roger Smith presented a book for his library from the choirists. And there was a bouquet of flowers for Mrs. Lambie, presented by Andrea Chaplin.

Mrs. John McWulfin extended best wishes from the parish to Mr. and Mrs. Lambie as they enter their new field of endeavor.

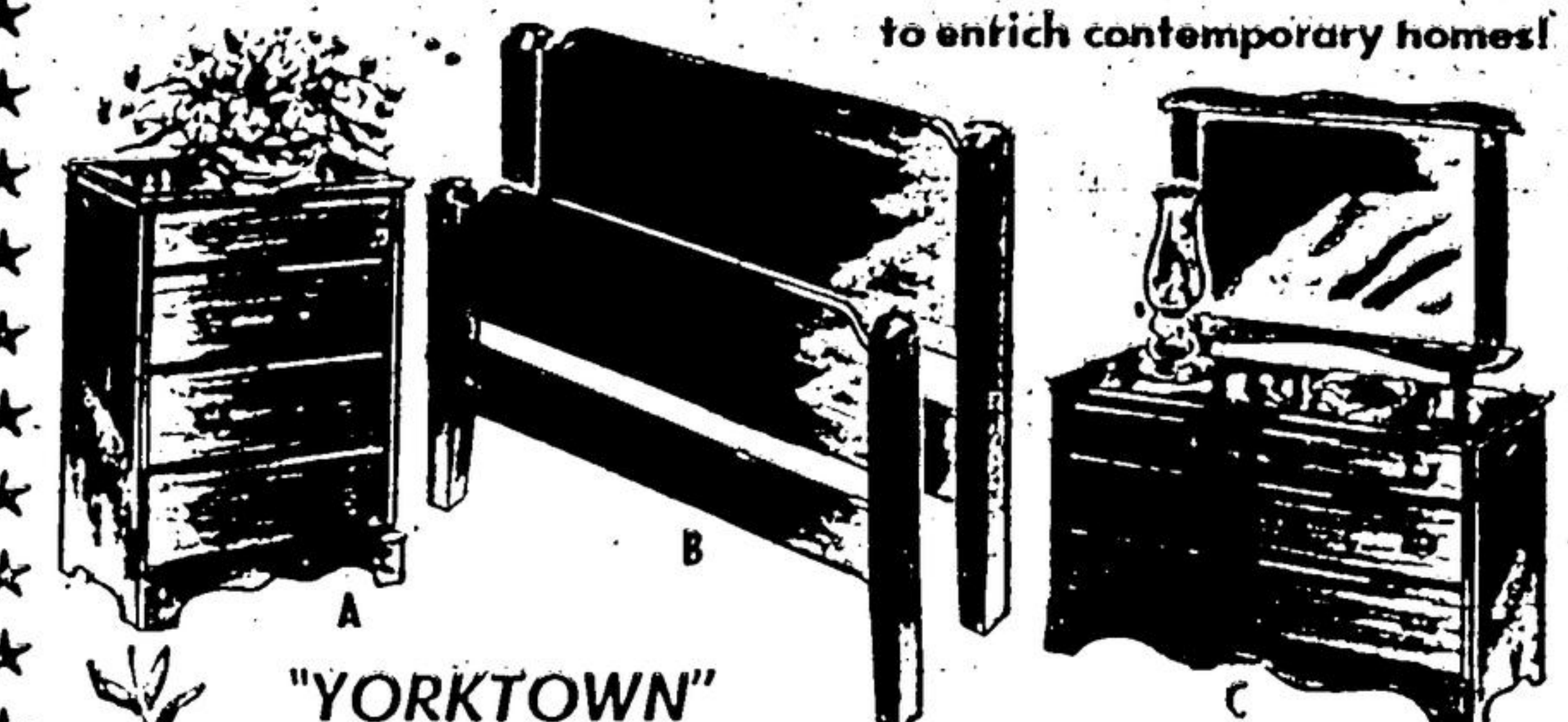
