Staggered Plantings Ensures Best Garden

By Gordon Lindsay Smith The experienced gardener would never think of sowing all his flower and vegetable seeds at once. Even if it survived the hazards of weather, the result would be a blaze of flowers and a super-abundance of fresh vegetables, then a famine. Everything would come on at once and end at the same time. The smart gardener spreads out the plantings making at least two and sometimes three or four from 10 days to two weeks apart. In this way he is ensuring success because if the first planting gets frozen or washed out or tramped on, he will still have one in reserve. More important, he will have something coming on all the time, fresh corn and peas not just for a few days but for many weeks and bouquets of beautiful flowers too. With plantings well spread out the garden should be blooming and producing abundantly from late in June until snow and with a few special tips and short cuts which you will be hearing about in future articles, we can add several weeks to the normal season as well.

Magazines Get Break In Insert Samples

Changes in postal regulations designed to give wider leeway to magazine advertisers were announced today by the Hon. William Hamilton, Postmaster General, in a move described as an additional step to implement the spirit of the O'Leary Royal Commission on publications. Up to the present, the Post Office has considered that pieces of merchandise "lipped on or bound into periodicals were 'samples' in addition, bound in pages of material containing a statement that the page was printed on the material advertised were also considered to be 'samples.' As such, these items were charged at a higher postage rate. Under the new regulations announced today, advertising inserts composed of paper, clear plastic, foil, fabric or other material having the general characteristics of paper will normally be accepted at the usual postal rate for periodicals, without additional charges. In making the announcement, Mr. Hamilton pointed out that a study of advertising matter in periodicals had shown that for the most part of the purpose of such advertising inserts in periodicals was merely to illustrate the type of product advertised, rather than to demonstrate its usability. For instance, Mr. Hamilton explained, a swatch of cloth affixed to an advertisement can only be regarded as an illustration of the advertised material and is in no way usable. In contrast, a razor blade or a pill would be usable and would be subject to additional postage. The Postmaster General said that insects and 'lip ons' which met the new conditions would be accepted at the usual rate for periodicals whether or not the inserts contain any statement printed on the special material advertised.

Lavoie Knitting Is Moving To Acton

Acton Industrial Commission has announced it is expected that J. Lavoie Textiles of Milton and Georgetown will locate in Acton this summer. Negotiations are under way for the present time to lease approximately 8,500 feet of space in the Canada Packers building, and it is expected that arrangements will be completed shortly to enable work to start on alterations which will be required. J. Lavoie Textiles is a well-established company in operation for many years, and will continue their custom wool spinning operations with knitting of men's socks. The company will employ initially in the neighbourhood of 15 to 25 people. It is interesting that after the five years Acton will again have a wool spinning industry located in this same building. Some difficulty has been encountered in the accommodating of some pieces of machinery which will measure approximately 140 feet in length, but once these problems have been solved, plans will progress for operations to commence approximately in August. Located in this building are already a number of diversified industries: Michigan Bulb, Waleigh Furniture Limited, Kestler Ornament Company Limited, Thermold Division of H. K. Porter Canada Ltd., United Textiles, Carr Yastanar Company of Canada, J. Lavoie Textiles, and also the movement of traffic. Storage space is also being utilized by A. P. Green Fire Brick Company Limited and Corona Shoe Company Limited. Grounds are being well maintained and alterations are continuing in progress to accommodate tenants both with regard to manufacturing space and parking. Under consideration at the present time are plans for the installation of a main entrance to the building, new independent escape stairwells, and also a freight elevator to service the basement and third floor of the building. This will make available two new areas to future prospective industries. The building is under the management of Beardmore & Co. Limited personnel.
