Standard Products Upsweep In Business

Net income of the Standard Products Company which has a plant in Georgetown increased to \$571,300 or 74 cents a share for the nine months ended March 31st, compared with a loss of \$28,970 or 35 cents a share for the same period a year ago, P. R. Valpey, President, announced today.

The earnings included 10 cents a share of non-recurring income from the sale of real estate and equipment, he said. Net operating income of 36 cents a share for the next three months ended March 31 compared with a loss of 24 cents for the same quarter a year ago.

Sales Climbed
Sales of the automotive parts and building products company climbed to \$10,122,655 during the third quarter, 20 per cent above the \$8,468,803 total for the same quarter last year. This was the first quarter of the current fiscal year in which sales exceeded those of a year ago, Mr. Valpey said. For nine months, total sales were \$28,795,842, compared with \$28,408,750 for the same three quarters of the preceding year.

Mr. Valpey said that the sales and net income outlook for the fourth and final quarter of the fiscal year ending June 30 is "quite good," and current projections are for net income of \$1.10 a share or better for the year.

Control Exhaust
"Standard Products is intensifying work on its experimental devices to control the emission of unburned hydrocarbons from automobile exhausts and believes that these devices may provide the ultimate answer to control of smog created by automobiles," Mr. Valpey said.

Highest Ever
Mr. Valpey also reported that current releases from custom-ers of a recently enlarged plant in Georgetown, Ont., indicate May sales will be the highest month in the history of the company's Canadian operations, and the production of automo-

tive parts at U.S. plants also is at high levels. He also pointed out that while our principal activity is the sealing of automobiles, it is interesting to note that we have supplemented our auto-
