Researchers Study Sonic Boom Solution

Ottawa: Special to the Herald: That old tongue twister about how much noise annoys an oyster represents an increasingly touchy subject for the Royal Canadian Air Force. While the RCAF isn't very worried about oysters, except as an officers' mess delicacy, it is vitally concerned about public reaction to the crescendo of noise that its modern supersonic planes are creating.

It was apparent here recently when the RCAF hosted press and government dignitaries at a preview of the new CF101B Voodoo interceptors. These complicated and costly (\$1.6 million each) flying weapons systems are much bigger, much faster, more powerful and much noisier than the now almost-obsolete CF100s they are replacing in the home defence squadrons.

The air force is fully conscious of this and is anxious to maintain and improve its relations with the Canadian public by putting as much clatter as possible on the rear, screams, whistles, and bangs caused by their new planes.

Two types of noise are being faced and fought by the RCAF. One is the sonic boom created when a plane flies faster than sound. These booms are caused by shock waves building up in front of the plane. And, as waves from the bow of a boat roll ahead to strike the shore, sonic booms cause loud explosion noises on the ground and can break windows and do other damage to buildings.

Transient sonic booms occur when a plane dives faster than the speed of sound and the wave strikes only one ground area ahead of the aircraft. With Voodoos and other jets capable of travelling 1,200 miles an hour or more in level flight, there can be a continuous sonic boom which follows the flight path. Such a continuous sonic boom alarmed many southern Ontario residents not long ago.

To overcome the problem, the RCAF has prohibited its pilots from flying supersonically below 30,000 feet. And when flying faster than sound, aircraft are not permitted over built-up areas. In addition, the afterburners, which give the Voodoo its big take-off thrust, will not be turned on over built-up areas.

On take-offs, the pilots must rise quickly to 3,000 feet and then fly at reduced speed until clear of cities and towns. De-

M.P.'s Just "Mister" Until Election Ends

OTTAWA (Special to The Herald) — At the moment, there is no such a thing as a Member of Parliament in Canada.

Candidates in the current general election campaign who are identifying themselves in advertisements, in speeches or elsewhere, as "John Smith, M.P." have no right nor authority to do so.

In the Canadian parliamentary election system, members of parliament cease to exist at the moment that the Government-General signs the document dissolving parliament. In the present case, this happened on April 19. After that date, all 265 members of the House of Commons lost their designation as "MP" and became ordinary citizens.

And the country will be without any new MPs until those who are elected on June 18, are sworn into office shortly before the commencement of a new parliament and a new session, expected some time this fall.

But Canada is not a rudderless ship of state in the intervening months. The Conservative government continues to function and to make and announce decisions. This is provided for by the establishment of a committee of the Privy Council, known as the cabinet.

As head of the cabinet, Mr. Diefenbaker continues as Her Majesty's first minister. He will continue in that role unless the results of the June 18th vote show that some other party has gained a greater number of seats. If this happens, Mr.

Plan Upper Credit Dams Prior To Glen and Town

Dams planned for Orangeville, The Cataracts, near Bellfountain, Bellfountain itself, and Silvercreek will be given precedence over dams proposed for Glen Williams and Georgetown in the Credit Valley Conservation Authority flood control program.

Georgetown Dam as Early as Possible

At a meeting of the Executive Committee, CVCA members felt the designated projects to have precedence should be developed first "because of the more advantageous relationship of cost to benefit." However the committee members agreed that the Georgetown and Glen Williams dams should be proceeded with as early as possible "within the proposed plan of financing, but not so as to interfere with the completion of the Orangeville, Cataract, Silver Creek, and Bellfountain projects." Their decision was revealed in a release this week.

The printed report also announced that the Terra Cotta Conservation Area has been extended by the purchase of a large tract of land from Mr. Leslie. The CVCA agreed to pay \$23,000 for the land which will be known as the "Leslie area."

CREDIT VALLEY BRIEFS

A conservation authority member reported that Glen Williams cemetery is in danger of being undermined by the Credit, which is causing serious erosion. The Authority suggested that the Field Officer, Ted Spearin and the CVCA member R. R. Parker take steps to remedy the situation.

Speaking for a delegation from Huttonville, Mr. Ed Blair, urged the Credit Valley Authority to reconsider acquiring Huttonville Park for general conservation purposes. He emphasized the lack of control at that point resulted in unsanitary conditions and pollution. The Authority had previously considered purchasing the property but decided against it after an engineering report.

The Parks and Recreation board recommended that the swing bridge at Bellfountain be repaired and the parking lot at Terra Cotta be improved. They also advised that research be done on stocking the Terra Cotta ponds with trout.

The Authority has purchased a tree planter and nursery stock and are presently undertaking an extensive tree planting program in the Terra Cotta area.

Wants Updating Town By-Laws

"A worthwhile idea, but too time-consuming," is Mayor Sargent's opinion of a suggestion by Cr. Bob McNally that a special council committee peruse all town by-laws and update them where necessary.

Mayor Sargent told council Monday he could see no procedure other than to have council deal with by-law revisions when they are needed.

Free Phone Calls to Victoria, Snelgrove

Telephone users in Georgetown will be able to call all telephones in Victoria and Snelgrove free of long distance charges this fall, L. G. Denby, Bell Telephone manager for this region said this week.

The inclusion of these exchanges in Georgetown's local calling area does not increase the number of telephones that can be reached from Georgetown beyond the maximum allowed for Georgetown's present rate group, Mr. Denby added. This means the basic monthly rates for service will not be increased. He attributed the decision to enlarge Georgetown's local calling area to a consistent increase in the volume of long distance calling between Georgetown and the two neighboring communities.

"Studies are constantly being made of the calling habits among neighboring exchanges,"

he said. "When the volume of local calling warrants an extension of local calling privileges, steps are taken to eliminate the long distance charges which apply. This will be the third such extension for Georgetown in the past year," he added. The

As it gathered strength, it methodically chalked up gains such as getting the War Veterans' Allowance Act, the provision of free hospital treatment for indigent pensioners, the maintenance of soldiers' preference under the Civil Service Act, and the Hyndman Committee, which was set up to study unemployment among the veteran population. With each of these successes, the prestige of the Legion and the Canadian veteran rose.
