Liberals are doing this country infinite harm in their effort to panic Canadian voters with the spectre of mass unemployment which has no basis at all in reality.

This downgrading of the nation in the eyes of the world, a cheap political tactic to frighten the voter at home, is bound to discourage the investment of outside capital which this country needs to provide more jobs and yet further our prosperity.

And what is the Liberal answer to the employment situation, such as it is? Nothing, specifically, merely the same tired old promises these people had every opportunity to put into practice, but didn't through 22 years of dreary, uninspired administration.

True, mass unemployment was a distinct possibility in 1957 when Canadians turned the Liberals out. But Progressive Conservative initiative has assisted in the creation of 600,000 new jobs since, while Canada's general economy has boomed as never before.

Let's look for a moment at employment. The unfortunate jobs are largely the unskilled and those whose skills have been rendered obsolete by the continuing advance in scientific procedures. These people must be trained and retrained. To accomplish this purpose, the Diefenbaker administration has already invested more than \$4,000,000 in Halton County alone in new technical institutions. This is no promise, this has been done.

Otherwise, despite Liberal gloom the prospects are bright. Since 1958, labour income has increased nearly 30 percent, hardly a characteristic of bad times.

Progressive Conservative policies have kept unemployment at a percentage lower than in the United States, and this has never happened before in history.

Winter works, housing loans, public works and other projects have effectively checked unemployment in the short run. Vocational training, incentives to industry, and regional development projects are imaginative long term measures which will push production and employment to still higher levels.

Canada's economy is indeed booming. The Government licked the Liberal recession soon after taking office in 1957. Production, income, savings, exports — all soared to record levels in the years since. Inflation was licked. The total value of Canadian production has increased 22 percent in five years under a Progressive Government.

Tight money which threatened seriously to choke off Canadian development, has been licked. Interest rates have been lowered, more productive loans than ever before have been provided to home owners, to farmers, to fishermen, to veterans and to businessmen.

The Government has provided more grants to the Provinces, to the Municipalities, and the Universities than ever before in history.

Where then is the justification for all this gloom? Unable to recall a record that would match the Progressive Conservative story of achievement in the past five years, and apparently unable to produce a positive program for the future, the Liberals have resorted to scare tactics in a last ditch bid to produce votes. This is political bankruptcy. Enough of this nonsense! Let us get this election over and get on with the job of building prosperity with the 16 Point Conservative Program even Mr. Pearson has not attacked.

The charter surrender is simply a legal measure necessary to eliminate the former company name.

All age groups should receive this Vaccine whether or not they have been previously immunized with Salk Vaccine. Maximum immunity is obtained by the use of Salk Vaccine and the new Vaccine, and it is hoped that poliomyelitis can be eliminated entirely by the effective use of these two immunizing agents. Please urge your friends and neighbours to attend one of these schools. Adult clinics will be held from 7.00 to 9.00 p.m. at the schools indicated on the schedule.
