Intensive Care Units Speed Patient Recovery

Hospital Adds Extra Service on June 1st

A new measure designed to give better patient care and utilize the nursing staff to better advantage will be adopted at Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital on June 1st. Two rooms near each nursing station will be designated as "Intensive Care Units" and patients in these rooms will receive 24-hour around-the-clock nursing service.

The new service was adopted by the hospital board after discussion of a brief submitted by the medical staff, director of nursing and administrator. A patient's medical condition will be the criterion and he will be assigned to the intensive care unit only when so designated by his doctor. No visitors will be allowed to these rooms except on authorization of the administrator.

Special Nurses Advantages of the new plan are obvious.

The patients will receive, in effect, a special nursing service which would cost \$17.00 for each nursing shift if provided by himself. The hospital can avail itself of one or two registered nurses to "special" from four to eight patients. Unless such service is no longer required, the doctor will notify the hospital and a patient will be moved to accommodation suitable to his insurance coverage or to that which he requests.

Discussing the new system with the Herald, administrator Graham Gilhooly stressed that people should not be worried if all members of the family are assigned to an intensive care room.

"It does not mean that a person is at death's door or that his condition is necessarily serious," he said. "It is just that we want to give him the best care to speed his return to health."

The rooms, he continued, will have all necessary equipment for complete treatment.

"As the system becomes functional we hope to expand this which a patient will be transferred to a number of different categories ranging from intensive care to self-help," he explained.

This is a fairly new concept of hospital treatment, Mr. Gilhooly concluded, designed to make a patient as well as possible before his discharge from hospital.
