County TB Contributions Are Highest Per Capita

The work of the Halton County Tuberculosis and Health Association was praised by Alexander Best, M.P. at its annual dinner meeting in the Oakville Arena Fine Room last Wednesday evening.

"I hope and pray that you will have great success in the year that is ahead of you," said Mr. Best. "I want to congratulate you on behalf of the government on the fine work you are doing."

Stanley Hall, M.L.A., extended greetings on behalf of the Ontario government, and Mayor William Anderson proffered a welcome on behalf of the town. Fergus Kelly, senior sales consultant of the Ontario Tuberculosis Association told the gathering that Halton has the highest per capita contribution in Ontario in the Christmas Seal campaign.

"This is quite an enviable situation," said Mr. Kelly, "and it has been merited. You have a wonderful board and a wonderful spirit of co-operation."

"This has been a year of significance, not only for the County Unit but for the Provincial and Federal organizations as well," said William A. Benson of Acton, the president. In his remarks, "This has been a year in which a greater awareness has been created in the minds of many Canadians of the common goal we all seek, which is the control and ultimate eradication of tuberculosis in our respective communities and in our country as a whole."

"The mass survey conducted in Halton county last fall in conjunction with the Ontario Department of Health saw 42,504 persons skin tested or X-rayed, out of which seven active cases of tuberculosis were uncovered. In the light of such findings this survey can be

termed to be successful, when one considers the future impact on the health of our communities, had these cases not been revealed."

Dr. A. F. Bull, Director of the Halton Health Unit reported that during the year the Association continued to cooperate with the Unit. A monthly clinic is now operating in Oakville and Burlington, and a monthly X-ray clinic in Burlington, Oakville and Milton. X-ray clinics are held every two months in Acton and Georgetown, and chest clinic facilities at the Mountain Sanatorium, Hamilton, the Gage Institute, Toronto, and the Freeport Sanatorium are available to Halton county residents.

"The number of new cases being discovered continues to decrease," reported Dr. Bull, "and the tuberculosis death rate during 1961 was at the low figure of 2.3 per hundred thousand population in Ontario."

The annual financial statement showed a bank balance on March 31, of 1962, of \$33,850, available for the 1962-63 program.

Mr. Benson, the president, was chairman of the meeting. Guest speaker was C. J. Herpel of the Waterloo Trust and Savings Co., Kitchener, who spoke on the making of wills, giving some of his experience as an estate officer.

Seek Preservation Halton Beauty Spot

An appeal to preserve what was described as one of the last unspoiled beauty spots in the lower part of Halton county was made to council, Tuesday night, by Mrs. H. B. Burkholder, a resident of the area west of the Twelve Mile Creek and north of the Queen Elizabeth Way, which the Planning Board recommended for industrial zoning in 1957.

Mrs. Burkholder told the council that residents of the area had voiced objections to the proposed rezoning in 1957. The board had recommended that part of the land be made a residential area, and that the remainder be changed to industrial zonings. The land extends some distance back from the bank of the creek, and includes a woodlot which has been in the Burkholder family for more than 100 years and contains the last white oaks in this district. While the official plan has been amended to show the industrial rezoning, the necessary by-law amendment has not been made. On April 26 of this year, the Planning Board passed a motion that recommended to council that the zoning by-law be amended to conform with the official plan provisions for the area. Mrs. Burkholder requested that action be taken to have the land kept residential.

"No by-law has been put through to make it official," said Councillor A. M. Maxon. "If we pass a by-law we will be open to every industry that comes along," observed Councillor Frank Gallagher. "It will be very expensive to revise it at the present time."

Councillor W. E. Ford thought it would be a mistake to open the area to industry. On motion of Councillor Gallagher, it was decided to defer action on the by-law.

Female Assistant for Oakville Meter Reading

Motivated in Oakville was faced with the embarrassing situation of receiving a parking ticket from a female within the next few months.

The Oakville Council at a meeting Tuesday night recommended the hiring of a female assistant to make out parking tickets and summonses as well as the sorting and rolling of money deposited in the parking meters. It was also hoped that the new female assistant will act as a switchboard operator to relieve the sergeant for more important duties.

At the present time all the sorting out and counting of money is done by the lone meter officer, and the police department is finding that this takes up a lot of his time, which should be spent on enforcement of parking tickets or repairs of faulty machines.

Good Excuse
Councillor Frank Gallagher issued a slight protest against the addition of a female to the police force. "It seems to me," said Mr. Gallagher, "that the department is leading people all the time. But the excuse is good."

Town Manager Kenneth Needham said that the cost of hiring a meter assistant would be charged to the parking meter fund which collects a revenue of approximately \$18,000 per year.

Mr. Needham-informed council that a young girl just starting out in a working career was needed for the job.
