Promise Immediate End To Burning of Garbage

Contractor, Council Discuss the Problem

Promise of an immediate house cleaning at the town's sanitary landfill site was made by Bob Lane when council. discussed the problem with him at a special council meeting Thursday.

The town will erect signs indicating that no private; dumping can be made at the site on Saturdays and Sundays or from 5 pm. to 7 a.m. other days. And letters will b sent to out-of-town collectors said to be using the town facilities, indicating that this will no longer be possible.

"It's a blot on the municipal cene to have fires burning constantly and there is nothing faintly resembling landfill" he said. The mayor had been called from the meeting to hear a complaint from a commuter saying the dump was on fire that evening.
