Promise Immediate End To Burning of Garbage

Contractor, Council Discuss the Problem

Promise of an immediate house cleaning at the town's sanitary landfill site was made by Bob Lane when council discussed the problem with him at a special council meeting Thursday.

The town will erect signs indicating that no private dumping can be made at the site on Saturdays and Sundays, or from 5 p.m. to 7 a.m. other days. And letters will be sent to out-of-town collectors will be using the town's facilities, indicating that this will no longer be possible.

FLOOD OF COMPLAINTS

The meeting was called after a flood of complaints about garbage burning and a charge that polluted air decided not to locate in town because of polluted air. Town solicitor George Hewson was invited to the meeting and gave legal opinion that if the sanitary landfill system has not been used, the garbage contract would be broken.

END TO PROBLEM

A motion by Cr. Fred Harrison to end the contract July 1st was withdrawn following Mr. Lane's promise. But Cr. Harrison said he would present the motion again a week from Monday if daily reports on the landfill site by the works superintendent do not indicate an end to the problem.

Mayor Sargent spoke strongly as he introduced the question.

"It's a blot on the municipal scene to have fires burning constantly and there is nothing faintly resembling landfill," he said. The mayor had been called from the meeting to hear a complaint from a commuter saying the dump was on fire that evening.

Cr. Harrison said that if the dump is covered every night as the contract calls for, there could be no burning problem.

FAMILY TREES

"I'm surprised to see how this has been soft-pedalled by the local newspapers," he said. "If little things creep up in council they make mountains of them. I can't understand this unless we check back to family trees. Or perhaps there are business reasons."

Reeve Elliott was of an opposite opinion.

"The press has been very wise not to publicize this too much. It's poor publicity for our town," he said.

Cr. McNeilly criticized last year's council for renewing the garbage contract without calling tenders.

END TO END

"I'll admit there have been some alterations since we visited the site a week ago, but tonight it is burning end to end," he said.

Council should do one of three things, he felt, move the site from the industrial area; call tenders and have penalties in an agreement; or inaugurate municipal collection under the works superintendent.

Mr. McNeilly said that municipal collection wouldn't be as cheap as he thought, as any contractor has the same costs and must make a profit too.

Cr. Barrager said the main problem is burning and the present site is ideal since this is controlled. There can be no question of moving a garbage site out of town "because our neighbours won't have us," he felt.

Cr. Barrager said figures had been obtained last year on municipal collection.

"What I would like to quote what it would cost to buy our equipment and hire our own help, but it's staggering," he said.

He suggested a committee discuss the situation with the contractor.

"I'm surprised," replied Cr. Harrison. "We've asked and pleaded to have this cleaned up and now after a month, Cr. Barrager thinks a committee should approach the contractor. That's one of the weakest statements I've ever heard him make."

Cr. Cook said he would favour municipal collection even if it costs an extra thousand dollars a year and produced figures to show that the town could do the job at a yearly capital cost of \$30,640.

LARGER STAFF

Deputy-Reeve Hunter opposes municipal collection. This would mean a larger works staff, and an overload on the works superintendent. If satisfaction cannot be gained from the present contractor, he favours calling new tenders.

Mayor Sargent said there were motions before him that he preferred not to read until the subject had been thoroughly discussed.

"I don't want to find ourselves in the position where we mightn't be able to look after garbage collection," he warned.

At this point, Cr. Emmerson suggested the contractor be called and invited to the meeting.

"Surely we can come up with a businesslike solution," he said. "Certainly I don't think it's economical to take over collection as a municipal function."

A statement to the people of Ontario from Prime Minister John Diefenbaker

"Five years ago the Canadian people gave me and my colleagues a mandate to end the years of indecision and neglect of Liberal rule and make a start in the New National Policy which we put before the Canadian people in 1957. You gave us a renewal of your mandate in 1958.
