## Will Select Dairy Princess At Hornby

The search is on for a Halton Dairy Princess to represent the County at the annual Dairy Princess Competition at the Canadian National Exhibition. The Halton Dairy Princess Committee is represented by all of the dairy producer groups in Halton, the Federation of Agriculture and the Halton Junior Farmer Association. Following a recent meeting of the Committee, it was decided that this year's selection would take place at the Annual Hornby Garden Party, to be held on Saturday evening, July 21st.

The contestants from Halton will be selected by interview with a panel of three judges. In addition, each contestant will present a short talk related to dairying in Halton County. Contestants in the competition must be between the ages of 17 and 26 years, and from a dairy farm.

At the C.N.E. competition the delegates from each county will compete for the Ontario title. In addition to the interview and speech, each contestant will personally demonstrate milking and cleaning procedures. A detailed basis of awards is used for the competition, to include appearance, deportment and self-expression. The balance of the score card is set-up to rate the efficiency of milking, and cleaning dairy equipment. All entries for the Halton Dairy Princess Competition must be made to the committee by Monday, July 22nd. Application forms and information may be obtained at the Extension Branch office, Ontario Department of Agriculture, Milton.

## CNR YARDS LOWERED ONE FOOT

The entire Georgetown freight yards are being lowered one foot in an extensive operation which started there last week. While work is going on the traffic crossing at the station will be closed and there will be no rail traffic on the northern line to Barrie. The crossing will be reopened after ten days. Trains from the north are being rerouted around Georgetown. The northern line is being used to locate boarding cars occupied by CNR working crews.

At the same time, CNR telegraph men are putting cross-arms on the newly erected telegraph poles, and stringing new wire. The operation includes moving a bank opposite the Alliance Mill and earth moving machines are working there now hauling the fill to other locations on the project. The work was temporarily halted May 29th when a machine broke a Provincial Mill drain near the John St. culvert.
