Chinguacousy Council Stands Behind Clerk

Chinguacousy Council stood behind clerk-treasurer George Breckenridge Tuesday night. The township's auditing firm had recommended splitting the past and engaging a treasurer, with Mr. Breckenridge retaining his post as clerk.

"This also calls for a statement on Mr. Breckenridge's behalf — he has worked faithfully for the township with many tribulations," the auditors' report added.

Not One Cent

"To the best of our knowledge, not one cent of Chinguacousy Township funds is unaccounted for," continued the report. But the auditors charged that the office staff is unable to look after the accounting. With the auditors doing it as a special service, it was expensive to the township.

The auditors claimed they were unable to gain a satisfactory explanation of an \$22,000 issue paid by Bramalea Developments, adjusting the industrial-residential ratio.

The auditors said that they had attempted to learn how the industrial-residential ratio was calculated but were refused. Because of this they could not determine if it was correct.

Further Information

"Since our report was filed, the Department of Municipal Affairs has asked for further information regarding our comment on the \$22,000," said the report.

The auditors asked council to either furnish the necessary information on how the figure was arrived at or authorize the clerk to sign a letter to Bramalea requesting their calculations.

"This council is getting con-

siderable criticism in the local press," said Reeve Clark. "As far as I'm concerned — not a dollar is out of place in Chinguacousy."

With Mr. Breckenridge would refrain from making statements on his own to the press," said Councillor Harold Wilson. "I'm sick and tired of it."

"I'm sick and tired of people saying I'm not competent," retorted Clerk Breckenridge.

"This auditor's report says that you're not competent," said Councillor Wilson.

"Council knows about these Bramalea accounts as well as I do," said the clerk.

Deputy-reeve George Gardhouse pointed out that council had already hired an assistant clerk-treasurer, to start June 4.

Read Statement

Emerging from a closed session, Reeve Clark read a prepared statement to the press.

"The monies paid to the township by Bramalea Consolidated Developments Ltd., over and above the residential-industrial ratio were paid by Bramalea to make sure that the impact of development in the township would have no adverse effect on the township in accordance with the original agreement."

Clerk Breckenridge said he withheld calculations on the excess \$22,000 because he felt it had to be council's decision to give this information to the auditors.
