



Fall-Out Shelter Campaign Not Complete Failure

Announcement from Ottawa that the campaign to encourage fall-out shelter building has rebounded off deaf ears is not entirely true. Many home owners throughout the country have responded by constructing basement shelters and stocking them with provisions listed in a recent series of news releases from the Emergency Measures Organization.

In Georgetown the number of fall-out shelters is of course unknown, and in fact the EMO have urged shelter builders not to go out of their way in making their protective measures known since in the event of a nuclear attack the safety spot could become flooded with every family within five blocks.
