

Competition Starts for Herald Shooting Trophy

Announce Rules for Small Bore

The first round of competition among Georgetown Anglers and Hunters Club members for The Herald Trophy was held at the club range last night. The trophy has been put up for small bore rifle competition within the club.

Shooting will continue each Wednesday evening with the June champion to be declared June 27th. Dominion Marksman targets may also be shot on these evenings. Anyone interested in this activity is invited to visit the club or contact Donald Hancock, Rifle Chairman or Donald Powers, president. Rules have been drawn up and are printed below.

GEORGETOWN ANGLERS & HUNTERS ASSOCIATION - RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE HERALD TROPHY

1. Competitors must be members of Georgetown Anglers and Hunters Association in good standing.
2. Targets shall be the standard Dominion 30 yd. targets supplied by the Club.
3. Twenty targets (10 prone, 10 standing) must be fired within the prescribed period, with a maximum of ten targets on any one date.
4. Ten rounds only to be fired at each target.
5. Club reserves the right to supply all ammunition at established Club prices.
6. The number of points of a shot will be decided by the edge of the shot hole nearest the centre of the target, using a .33 plug gauge when required. If the flange of the gauge touches the line, the highest points will be credited. Chairman of Rifle Committee is to be final judge. Score on any given target must be posted on date shot.
7. Sporting type rifles only may be used with a maximum weight of seven pounds.
8. Slings are not permitted.
9. Any sight not fitted with glass may be used. A single glass may be used in the rear sight as a substitute for spectacles.
10. The competitor having the highest score will be declared the small bore rifle champion for the period, and his name will be inscribed on a shield on The Herald Trophy.
11. An entry fee of fifty cents (\$50) will be charged all competitors, the money to be used to purchase a small trophy to be retained by the winner for the period.
12. Winners will be handicapped on the next trophy shoot, to the extent that they will be required to

shoot two additional targets in the standing position in lieu of the prone position. Each winner will be handicapped in the same manner.

Lands, Forests Sets Deer Hunting Season

The Hon. J. W. Spooner, Minister of Lands and Forests, has announced open seasons for hunting deer in southern Ontario. The seasons for the northern and western parts of the province were established for a three-year period which expires with the 1961 season.

Details for seasons in northern and northwestern Ontario for deer and moose which are included in the three-year schedule are available from the Department of Lands and Forests in summary form.

There will be a bow and arrow season for deer on Manitoulin Island from October 19th to November 14th. The regular gun season will run from November 15th to 25th. The use of dogs is prohibited.

The Deke Indian Reserve lying outside the French River in northern Parry Sound District will again have a season, running from November 1 to 25th. Non-Indians may not enter the reserve without the permission of the Indians. However, they are invited to hunt on this reserve provided they have an Indian guide.

The Crown lands in the Township of Matchedash in Simcoe County will be open for deer hunting from November 8th to 9th.

The counties of Leeds, Grenville, Prescott, Russell and that part of Carleton lying east of the Rideau River will be open from November 8th to

Albermarle running from November 6th to 11th. In both seasons, the use of dogs for hunting deer is prohibited. Further season for deer in southern Ontario will be announced at a later date.

Only shotguns will be permitted in this farming area. In Carleton County lying west of the Rideau River, part of Frontenac County and those parts of Lennox and Addington, Hastings and Peterborough lying south of No. 7 Highway and north of No. 2 Highway, the deer season will be from November 6th to 11th. Only shotguns will be permitted in the Townships of Ennismore, Smith, Douro, Dummer, Belmont, North Monaghan, Ottawa and Asphodel.

In the Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, the deer season will run from November 8th to 9th. Shotguns only are permitted and the use of dogs is prohibited in these counties.

Announcing deer seasons for the Bruce Peninsula, the Minister said that the Township of St. Edmunds will have a deer season for archers from October 30th to November 4th. The regular gun season will follow in the Townships of St. Edmunds, Lindsay, Eastnor and

President Perc Raines reports the green is in good shape and there is room for a few more members. Bowling starts at 7:30 on the regular nights.

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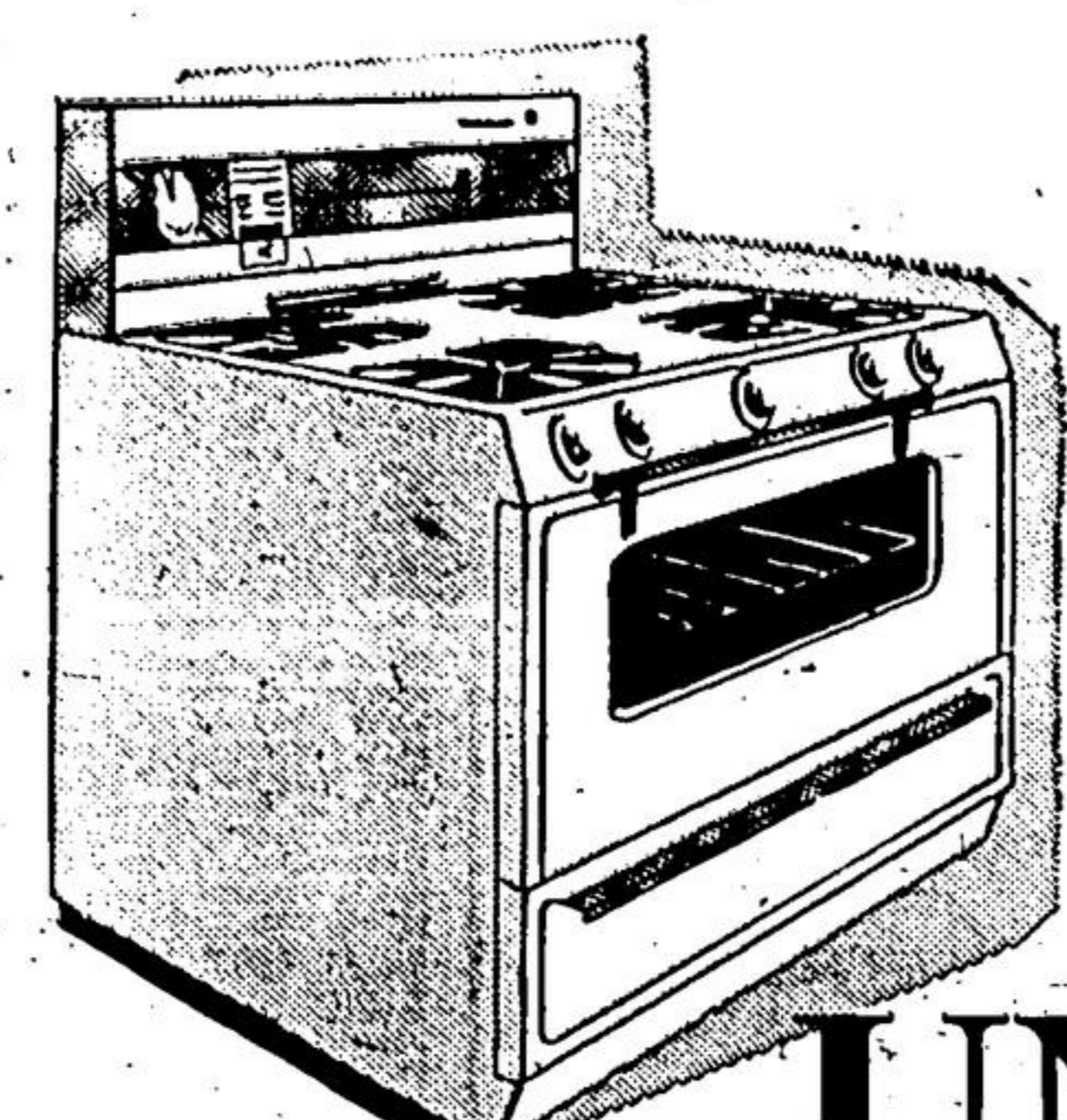
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
