

Outhit Campbellville But Trimmed in Scoring

The Yankees of the Halton County Intermediate Baseball League, Campbellville Merchants, bombed Georgetown with a nine run inning to capture their 11th here last Wednesday night 11 to 2. It was the third consecutive defeat suffered by the Georgetown crew since their opening day win in Acton.

About the only consolation the locals salvaged out of the shattering is the fact that Georgetown was superior to the Campbellville association of the bats, collecting 8 hits to the winners' 4. Spotty glove work by Georgetown made the difference. The locals committed 7 errors in the field, 4 of them in the big 2nd inning when Campbellville scored their 9 of just four hits.

The balance of the Merchants' scoring was done in the 4th when Wingrove and Cairns crossed the plate on sacrifices by Elliott and Chester.

Georgetown collected two hits in each of the first three innings, went hitless in the 3rd and 4th frames and managed one hit in each of the 6th and 7th, but still managed to push only two runs across, both of them in the early innings. Paul Legge singled, was advanced by Ron Litchie's sacrifice and scored on Charlie Jewell's line single, as Georgetown took a 3-0 lead at the end of the first. 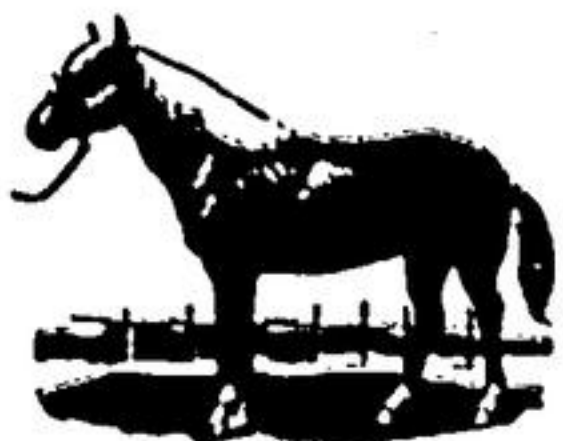
Track Club to Meet

Answering a complaint by Martin Horan concerning a car damage claim which was turned down by the town's insurance firm, a letter from the agency handling this was read to council Monday.

It reported that a staff adjuster had retraced the investigation after receiving Mr. Horan's complaint and that after a full report the company felt the town was not liable for the damage which Mr. Horan claimed was caused by defective roads.

An Irate John Street ratepayer A. W. Thompson commented on a tax rise to \$102 from \$112 in five years on his property, and thought this unjustified in view of no improvements in his area and lack of job opportunities in town. His road complaint was turned over to the road committee.

Letters from the Graham Bell and Canadian Compact Industries firms noted the town's directive about no burning of garbage and said this had not been their practice.
