

Approve Abattoir on Esqueusing 7th Line

Esqueusing Council approved the construction of an abattoir on the 7th Line, just beyond Shepparstown towards Hornby, at their meeting Monday night.

On the ten acre site, owner Alois Niellispach, plans to erect a sixteen thousand, five hundred dollar building, six hundred feet back from the road, and a thousand feet from the nearest residence, in compliance with Public Health requirements.

Retail Outlet

"Have there been any complaints about the Hornby abattoir?" Reeve W. Bird asked the Health Unit Inspector. "None," he replied, "and there is no reason for objections if the owner meets the Public Health Act requirements."

"What about water, you'll need a lot of it?" queried Coun. W. Leake. "The well has been drilled and tested," answered Mr. Sullivan of the County Health Unit. "There seems to be lots of water."

Mr. Niellispach explained that custom killing of approximately 8 steers and 25 hogs a week, is anticipated. In the future a retail outlet might be added.

In expressing his opinion on the construction of the abattoir George Currie stated, "Sure, I approve, the business is needed in the area, and the assessment is welcome. As long as they comply with the regulations there will be no trouble."

The rest of the Council concurred with Mr. Currie.

Motel and Snack Bar

\$108,700 was the value of building reports issued in Esqueusing during May, Building Inspector Wm. Hulle told the Council.

The largest single permit

was \$45,000 for the motel and snack bar on Highway 25. The restaurant was residential building.

Another request for parade yard to operate a wrecking yard was rejected by Council Monday. This proposed location was No. 35 Bideroad, and the Town Line.

The petitioners pointed out that the yard could not be seen from any road.

Half Cade

Something new was added when relayman John Allan complained about a blind corner at the 37th Bideroad and the Youth Line. He offered to pay half the trucking costs to have the bank cut down, and in addition provide a spot for the sign.

Council decided to meet at the treacherous corner the next morning (Tuesday) to see what could be done.

Final approval of the building of the new Esqueusing municipal building was withheld by the Ontario Municipal Board until the debentures are sold or the bank furnishes proof of their willingness to finance it until the debentures are sold.

Georgetown Midgets and the Milton Juveniles played home and home games over the week end with Milton outpacing the two games in close play. On Saturday night at Milton Park, Milton nipped Georgetown in the last half of the six inning game, taking the contest 3-1.

Alister Blair started on the mound for Georgetown, pitched good ball and got relief from Bill Jeffers in the sixth with two men on.

Georgetown hit for two quick runs in the first inning, only to have Milton explode in the third to go ahead 2-2, on three hits and two errors. The leads came back in the 5th to tie the score. Milton surged ahead again in their half of the fifth only to see Georgetown take a 6-4 run lead in the top half of the sixth.

Loaded The Bases

Alister Blair walked the first man, Terry Lane dropped a fly ball to put two men on. Jeffers came in to relieve and walked a man to load the bases. Milton's next batter was safe on a fielder's choice by Praaswood who overthrew home plate, allowing the tying run to score. Next batter popped up, only to have Fletcher scribble the winning run in.

Some bad fielding errors and Lane getting caught off third heading for home in error, ended a basesloaded rally when Isles drew a walk. Big guns for Georgetown were Mike Cummins, Lane and J. Blair, with two hits each. Lane and Cummins each getting a double. Each team had seven hits; Milton making seven errors, Georgetown eleven errors, four being charged to catcher Russ Bradley.

Three Quick Runs

On Sunday afternoon, Georgetown played host to Milton in the return game and bowed to the juveniles 6-4. Milton opened with a bang for three very quick runs in the first inning on one hit and two errors by Praaswood at shortstop. Then Georgetown came back in their half of the first inning to score two runs on two hits. Milton tallied single runs in the third, fifth and sixth innings with Georgetown scoring in the fourth and sixth to trail Milton 6-4. Bill Jeffers for the home team handcuffed the opposition in the final three innings to go the route, with Milton bringing in McDuffie to relieve to hold the Georgetown batters scoreless. Georgetown, in the last two innings had the bases loaded but failed to get the big hits.
