Canadian Garden Service

TAKE IT EASY!

When it comes to planting the wise gardener doesn't get in a panic. He gardens a bit, makes sure the earliest things are planted and the grass cut, then he goes fishing or golfing or just sits in the sun and admires what he has done. That keeps him fresh and interested in gardening and next week or the week after he does some more. He usually sows about a third of his seed just as soon as the weather is safe. Then the next third is put in from two to four weeks later, and the final third is not sown until well into June or even July.

This spreads out the harvest of bloom or vegetables, gives some insurance against unexpected frost, or a week or a curious neighbour's dog, and means that there is something coming on in the garden from early in June until after the first killing frost in late fall.

OF COONS, DOGS, SQUIRRELS AND RABBITS

Despite the fact that our cities have been growing by leaps and bounds, so-called wild life seems to be increasing too. Around old places like Halifax, Montreal, Toronto and Hamilton, there are probably more rabbits, skunks, coons and groundhogs than there ever were and even deer are on the increase in areas where they were extinct 50 years ago. Fortunately it is possible, though not always inexpensive, to protect one's garden and

shrubbery without poison or gunfire. To keep these marauders as well as stray dogs and cats away from shrubbery, there are certain sprays that we can get that will act as repellents. And we can also use permanent or temporary wire fences as high as necessary.

One of the very best protective devices for the vegetable garden is an electric fence, and it is easily installed. With care the battery and other equipment will last for years. One strand of charged wire a few inches from the ground will keep rabbits well away from peas, carrots and lettuce. Coons are more of a problem and to keep them out of corn, an additional 12 to 18 inches of poultry wire with the electric fence on top is advised.

TIMELY HINTS

Commercial fertilizer is clean, practically odourless and simple to use, though care should be taken not to let it actually touch tender plants. A fool-proof way for small applications is to dissolve in a watering can and simply pour along the rows, or we can sprinkle well with a hose after application, or do the job just before or during a rain-fall.

One of the greatest pleasures in the flower garden comes from a five minute tour before the day's work begins, or in the evening. This not only gives you the satisfaction of seeing fresh new blooms each day but also serves to check the condition of every plant. A wilted stem, a curled leaf, a ragged edge in the foliage all

TO MAKE CONFECTIONERY DROPS

Take double refined sugar pound and sift it through a Hair-sieve, not too fine; then sift it through a silk sieve; to take out the fine dust, which would destroy the beauty of the drop. Put the sugar into a clean pan, and moisten it with any favourite aromatic, if rose water, pour it in slowly, stirring it with a paddle. When the sugar will fall from as soon as it is moist enough, without sticking. Colour it with a small quantity of liquid carmine, or any other colour, ground fine. Take a smallpan with a lip, fill it three parts with paste, place it on a stove, the half hole being of the size of the pan, and stir the sugar with a little ivory or bone handle, until it becomes liquid. When it is most liquid, take it from the fire and continue to stir it, if it be too moist take a little of the powdered sugar, and add a spoonful to the paste, and stir it until it is of such a consistence as to run without too much extension. Have a tin plate, very clean and smooth, take the little pan in the left hand, and hold in the right a bit of iron, copper, or silver wire, four inches long, to take off the drop from the lip of the pan, and let it fall regularly on the tin plate, two hours afterwards, take off the drops with the blade of a knife.

COFFEE DROPS

An ounce of coffee to a pound of sugar will form a strong decoction: when cleared, use it to moisten the sugar, and then make the drops as above.

PEPPERMINT DROPS

The only requisites to make these are, extreme cleanliness, the finest sugar, and a few drops of the essence of peppermint.

Let the Telephone be Your Travelling Companion



Summer is here and with it comes vacation time. Like most folks in Georgetown, you're probably planning to do some travelling this summer. Remember the phone can help make your vacation more enjoyable. Be sure to call ahead to make hotel or motel reservations. It will save driving around at the end of a long day in a strange town looking for a place to stay. If you are delayed, a long distance call to those expecting you takes the pressure off the driver. A call to relatives along the route can alert them to a visit — or, if a visit is impossible, can offer the opportunity of a side-trip by phone. Then, at the end of the vacation, call the folks back home to reassure them that all's well. Yes, let the telephone be your travelling companion this summer and enjoy a happy, relaxed vacation.

Now that the building season is in full swing, it might be a good idea to remind you once again about our FREE Concealed Wiring Service for homes under construction. Our installers will place multi-wire cable between the walls throughout a new home provided this service is requested before the walls and partitions are closed in. Then, when the house is completed and the customer has chosen the location or locations, for telephone service, our installer will locate the hidden wire with an electronic instrument and connect the telephone, or telephones, with the wiring. A small attractive plastic faceplate will be affixed to the outlet from the wall and the only wire showing will be the lead to the nearby telephone. Most folks agree that this new FREE service is a real boon to the home builder and adds value to any new home. We've noticed that some customers in Georgetown have been phoning local information in an attempt to secure the number of a person living in Toronto or its suburbs. Although the information operator does have many records at hand, she does not have listings for Toronto customers. However, you can dial information for the whole of the 416 code area, making use of Direct Distance Dialing (DDD); simply dial 112 followed by the information number 355-1212. You will not be billed for this type of call.

It might be wise to consult the section in your telephone directory devoted to DDD each time you make use of this service. This extra check may avoid confusion and annoyance if the wrong area code is dialled. As an example, contrast us cities as Guelph are in the 519 code area and the 519 must be used to reach the correct number in that area.

Still on the subject of DDD, calls of this type can not be placed from a pay telephone. A person wishing to place a long distance call from a coin telephone should dial 'Operator' so that their call will go through properly and quickly.
