At the end of May 1962 there were 779 persons registered for employment at the Brampton office, a drop of 330 from the end of last month and a decrease of 281 from May 1961.

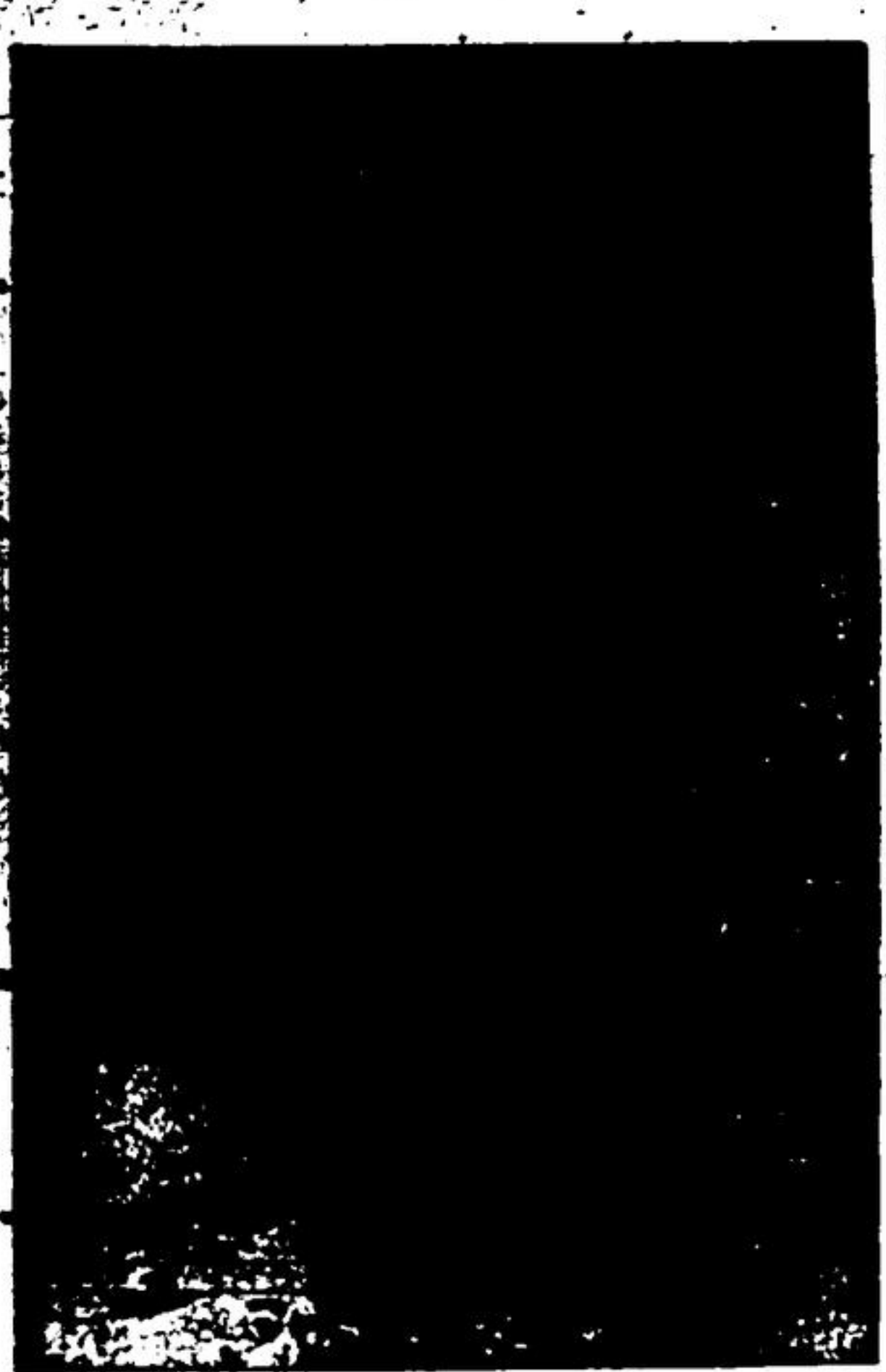
