## Niagara Trip For Grade Eight Pupils

Over the walls of the Fort and across the Niagara River, we could see Fort Niagara on the American side of the border. We were well on schedule and signed in at the Power Plant (Sir Adam Beck No. 2) shortly before three o'clock, There we saw how the electricity for much of southern Ontario is produced. five p.m. we had arrived at Niagara Falls where we were allowed one half hour on our own, but we were about thirty-five minutes late getting back to the bus.
