Parents Hear Of Work for Retarded Child

The Education Committee of the North Halton Association for Retarded Children, met with parents and friends to further educate their guests on the work being done in North Halton. Mrs. V. Kennedy, the chairman, opened the meeting with warm words of welcome and brief outline of the purpose of the meeting. It was ascertained that eleven parents were present, with a letter of regret for the inability to attend being received from one other parent. Mrs. Kennedy introduced guests and members of the North Halton Association and explained their activities in the Association. Mrs. Kennedy told what was hoped to be accomplished by the meeting, urging the parents to feel free to ask any questions and voice any opinions. She then introduced Mrs. W. Howard, Home Care Chairwoman. Mrs. Howard reported that her committee is endeavouring to establish an emergency home care centre so that anyone can find immediate help should the need arise. Plans are being made for a baby-sitting service, which will be made available to the parents of retarded children. Parents were advised to consider plans for their child's future.

Mrs. A. Milward, Georgetown, who is chairman of Institutions Committee informed the meeting of a parents rally being held at Orillia.

Mrs. N. P. E. Jeffares, principal of the school, informed the group of the events of the near future. The children are putting on a concert in Acton on June 19, on June 20 the children and their parents are invited to a picnic at the pony ranch of Mrs. Terrian, Malton, and on June 23 the Optimist Club of Burlington have made arrangements for a fun fair to be open to retarded children and their parents. Six children are to attend summer camp at Camp Ayr from August 11 to September 1.

Talk of Progress

Mrs. Jeffares advised that four books of interest to parents were available at Milton Library and she also gave a brief review of six books owned by the school and which are also available to the parents.

Discussion followed with the parents asking questions concerning institutional care for their children.

Mr. McNeil, School Inspector, explained that the Department of Education had made no change regarding the regulations governing children being admitted to school for a full day before the age of 12. He outlined the duties of the admission board and commended Dr. Hull, Medical Officer of Health for North Halton, and the health unit for their co-operation. Mrs. Jeffares, Mrs. Mitchell and Mrs. Hill, all teachers at the school, displayed the children's work and discussed the progress of each child with his parents.

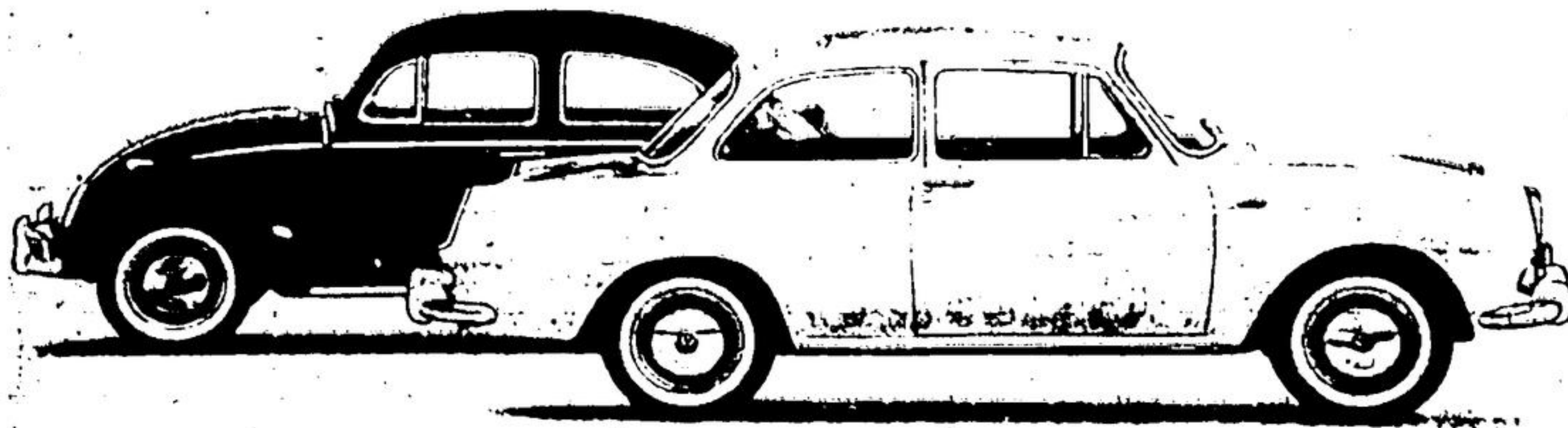
