NEXT YEAR'S BREAKFASTS

Split Decision Favours North Halton Deer Hunt

Split opinion on whether Halton should have an open deer season this fall, sparked a brisk Georgetown council debate Monday.

The resultant vote found five in favour and three opposed, with Cr. Jim Brown a question mark as he was not at the meeting. Deputy Reeve Hunter and Crs. Harrison and McNelly were opponents of the Elliott-Barrager motion.

Increase in Deer Count

The matter was discussed after a letter from county council asked an opinion.

Desirability of a short open season has been suggested by Lands & Forests Minister J. W. Spooner whose department feels increasing deer in this district of Ontario are causing crop damage, auto collision and the threat of disease in cattle.

The suggested season is McNelly knows nothing about November 5-6-7, when large numbers of hunters will be on the northern hunt. Dogs would not be permitted and firearms restricted to shotguns. Deputy Reeve Hunter was outspoken in his criticism of any open season.

"The agricultural committee of which I am a member has turned this down and I don't see why hunters from south Halton where no firearms can be discharged should come up here," he said.

Farmers Business

As for cattle disease, there is no proof of this, he pointed out.

"Mr. Spooner has a nerve asking us to tell farmers they should let hunters on their property," said Cr. Harrison.

"That's strictly a farmer's own business."

"Would you want to be responsible if a deer ran in front of a car and someone was killed?" asked Reeve Elliott.

"That doesn't enter the picture at all. That could happen if there was only one deer in the county" answered the deputy reeve.

Mr. Hunter wondered if Georgetown people would be happy to have hundreds of hunters climbing their fences.

"I've heard reports of what happens in the north and I don't want Georgetown to be a no man's land" opined Cr. McNelly.

This brought a stinging reply from Cr. Barrager who said Cr.

on the colourful trek to the park. The cavalcade will proceed along Guelph St. to Main, downtown to Park St. and into the park through the main gate.

Love A Parade

People lining the route will see The Georgetown Girls Pipe Band, the Lions chuckwagon, the famous fancy Simpson carriage, then all rodeo contestants in a colour party, the Kinmen float, the fifty members strong Patrolettes, a girls drum and bugle corps from Oakville, sponsored by the Hamilton Automobile Club, the Georgetown Firemen and a number of other organizations and floats.

The first Rodeo show starts at 1:30 in the afternoon in the oval arena in front of the permanent grandstand, and the night session of bulldozing, calf roping et al, goes at 7:30. It will end under the lights. Gord Lawrence from Kitchener and Georgetown's Roy Ineson will handle the mike.

But all the action won't be in the arena. On the track in the field will be pony rides and rows of concessionists. Strollers can choose from two hot dog booths, two pop booths and ice cream wagon, the beef barbecue booth, a milk shake bar, and a western hat booth and a concession centre for sellers in the stands. There are stores connected with two operations.

Roasted in Pit

The Lions started Friday to prepare the prime beef used in the beef burgers. The beef kings, Ernie Bodnar and John Matthews use a pit 3 feet wide, 4 feet deep and 18 feet long. Beginning at 9 o'clock Friday morning hick wood is burned in the bottom of the pit until the crew has a solid bed of coals to a depth of two feet. This takes until early Friday evening. Next step is covering the coals with about a half inch of sand. The beef is brushed with a flour, water and seasoning solution, wrapped in cheese cloth and burlap and placed on the sand layer. Then the pit is shovelled in and forgotten for approximately 16 to 20 hours. This year the Lions are doing some 21 roasts this way.

Western Breakfast

The milk shake bar operated by the hospital staff is a new concession. It will serve western breakfast to the contestants on the morning of the big day, and during the afternoon and evening will dispense shakes etc. to the thirsty crowd. Proceeds are earmarked for the hospital fund.

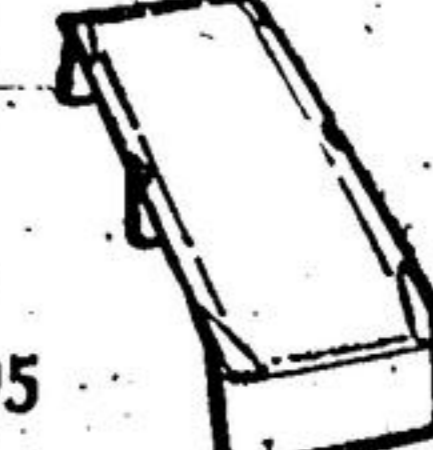
