



### Alliance Employee Was Thirty Years With Local Firm

Coating foreman at Alliance Paper Mills, Ltd., until he retired ten years ago, Alexander Smith McCumber, 74, of 10 Chapel St. E., died in Georgetown Hospital on June 13, following a lengthy illness.

He had been a town resident since 1923 when he came here to work with the Alliance firm. Prior to that he had been superintendent of the Blackstone Paper Co. at Pawtucket, Rhode Island and earlier spent 13 years with Standard Coated Paper Mills in Richmond, Va.

He was born at St. Martin's, New Brunswick, son of John and Elizabeth McCumber and was educated there and in St. John. He was a member of St. John's United Church.

He leaves his wife, Vivian Nelson, whom he married in Richmond, four children, Mrs. E. A. Hason (Mrs. of Toronto), Earl of New Toronto, Vernon of Georgetown and Elmer of London; eight grandchildren and one great grandson, and a sister, Mrs. John Schopp of Oak Park, Illinois. A son Lorne died in 1928.
