Cameron is Moderator Presbyterian Assembly

A Georgetown high school graduate obtained the highest office of the Presbyterian Church when Rev. Ross K. Cameron was elected moderator at the church's 88th general assembly.

Dr. Cameron, whose birthplace was Stratford, spent his boyhood in town where his father was minister of Knox Church and continued to reside here after his parents' death. He graduated from the University of Toronto and Knox College in 1922 and received an honorary degree of doctor of divinity in 1944.

He has been moderator of the presbytery of West Toronto and of the West of Toronto.

He has been minister for the last 22 years of Toronto's Devonport Rd. Church, served as an RCMP chaplain during World War II and attained the rank of squadron leader. He also held charges at Stratfordville and in Edson, Ont.

His son Donald is a law student in Toronto.

Dr. Cameron was elected on the first ballot of 240 communicants from 46 presbyteries across Canada.

LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

Select Committee on Manpower Training

BRIEFS INVITED

On April 18, 1962, The Legislative Assembly of Ontario appointed a Select Committee to investigate and make recommendations concerning:

1. The Apprenticeship Act and the regulations made thereunder;
2. All aspects of the apprenticeship system as presently established in Ontario and more particularly as it pertains to the training of persons in trades or crafts relating to the construction industry and in industrial undertakings;
3. The training of workers and more particularly re-training and upgrading of skills; and
4. The roles of government, industry and labour in this field.

Public hearings are expected to take place in the Parliament Buildings, Toronto, in September and October.

Individuals or organizations interested in presenting submissions to the Committee are invited to contact the Secretary no later than July 18th. The Committee will be glad to supply a list of specific questions upon which comment is particularly desired, as well as background information and advice which may assist interested parties in the preparation and presentation of briefs.
