Banquet Will Conclude Planning Workshop Series

Representatives from 15 municipalities in the Toronto sphere of influence will conclude a series of Regional Planning Workshops here on Thursday, June 28.

At a banquet to be held in Knox Church Hall, Georgetown, under the chairmanship of E. Y. Hyde, a discussion will be held on planning relationships between local municipalities and the province.

Guest speaker for the final session will be Dr. H. H. Mayo, Professor of Political Science of the University of Western Ontario, and former technical adviser to the Royal Commission on the Metropolitan Development of Calgary and Edmonton.

"In our four workshop sessions to date, we have been led to believe planning on a regional basis is the only defense against increasing urban sprawl which has proved disastrous to farmer and city dweller alike," Workshop Committee Chairman Alexander MacLaren, reports.

Two Extremes

"There seem to be two extremes in which planning in Ontario might perate. On the one hand, each municipality may be given freedom to plan or not to plan within its boundaries; on the other, the province would establish planning standards which would determine each municipality's development pattern."

Interest in the problem is evident from the number of persons who have already signified their intention of attending the final workshop.

Among them are representatives from the Department of Municipal Affairs, Department of Agriculture, Department of Economics and Development, Department of Highways, Department of Lands and Forests.
