Georgetown Proposal Gets Municipal Support

Continuing support for a Georgetown proposal that schools for retarded children should be treated equally to public schools by the provincial government, has been coming from other Ontario communities.

Council recently petitioned the government for this and asked other municipalities to side with it.

Thirteen more supporters were detailed by town clerk C. E. Benham to council on June 19th, including Sarnia, Midland, Oakville, Cornwall and Wingham.

But council had its first turn-down that night too in a letter from Burlington. That council claims that after consulting the local retarded children's organization, it found grants were actually slightly higher than those to public schools, but that being is contributed from school boards.

The retarded group is said of losing some of their money if the public school board takes over," said Cr. Harrison.

Mayor Sargent said Burlington is technically correct but Georgetown's request is for equal treatment for retarded children and this is where support has been received. North Halton Urban Board will discuss the matter with the county president of the retarded group.
