SCHEDULE INTERLOCKS WITH THREE OTHERS

The Principal, J. L. Lambert, and the Director of Physical Education, Lynn McLaren, attended the Annual Meeting of C.W.O.S.S.A. and the Director's Meeting afterwards.

The chief topic of discussion was the future status of Georgetown and four other schools which are seeking "A" rating. It was pointed out that some of the city colleges would be in favour of admitting Georgetown and the other schools at this time unless Georgetown would consent to being grouped with Owen Sound, both from the point of competition and travelling distance. This suggestion was rejected.

The school was appointed to study other things, the feasibility of new "A" grouping for C.W.O.S.S.A., which would include Georgetown with the Gospel Collegiate, Notre Dame Catholic High School, Gospel and John Ross Secondary School, Gospel. It was decided that for the present Georgetown would be left as a "B" school, still grouped with Acton and Milton.

Plans are being made for an interlocking schedule with Preston High School, Waterloo-Oxford District High School and Notre Dame Catholic High School on a trial basis for one year. Georgetown emerged from the meeting with one definite future arranged. Both Junior and Senior Rugby teams will play under the lights in Victoria Park, Kitchener, on Friday evening, September 21st, against the Junior and Senior teams of St. Jerome's College.

St. Jerome's were admitted to "A" standing in the League on a probationary basis and it is quite possible that Georgetown may be grouped with them in the future if other plans fall through.

A former Georgetown High School student, Bill Zillio, son of Mr. and Mrs. Antonio Zillio of Terra Cotta, earned a split decision over an Army boxer in the middleweight division of the big Army-Navy team boxing match at Camp Geagetown, New Brunswick, it was disclosed this week when results arrived from HMCS Shearwater on which Bill is stationed.

The win gave the Canadian Navy a 44 split with the Army in their 8 bitterly fought clashes, and was termed by the Geagetown newspaper, "the hardest fought bout of the set."

Zillio's opponent was Vick Vator of I RCHA. "Both were hard punchers, both were relentless and both developed bleeding noses" said the report. "They fought themselves to a standstill." The referee, Captain Basil Seaton, congratulated them both after Zillio was declared the winner on points.

MINOR BASEBALL NEWS

Last Saturday's Baseball Festival were well attended and produced a generous response to the boys tag blitz. The parade to the park was led by the colourful Georgetown Girls Pipe Band and a contingent from the Lorne Scots. The G.M.B.A. 1962 Rules and Regulations and Playing Rules are published this week in answer to the many enquiries received from parents and others interested.

In the International League an alert Richmond extended their winning string with a win over Buffalo 10-1. Columbus lost their third in a row to Rochester 10-1, while Toronto and Jacksonville produced a free for all 18-18 tie.

Two previously rained-out games were played in the American League. Boston played to a 3-3 tie with Baltimore. Boston scored all three runs in the fourth inning off relief pitcher W. Hoopes who took over from the mound from Gerry Coxak. In the other game, Kansas City beat Detroit 6-3 in a tight game which saw Detroit held to 3 runs gained in the first inning. Dave Guest who earlier made an important catch continued to turn in a good performance for Kansas after being struck by a pitched ball in the last of the inning.

Regular action in the American league produced a tight game between Detroit and Chicago. Detroit won 2-1. In a pitching duel which lasted 6 innings, Chicago pitchers recorded 14 strike outs and Detroit 13. Baltimore Orioles kept up a steady scoring for five innings to take their game with the Yankees 15-2.

A break-away nine runs in the second inning put Boston in the lead with a wide lead in their game with Cleveland. In the final three innings Cleveland went on the scoreboard for 11 runs. But Boston went ahead by 2 going into the last inning and a home run by Mark Brassard clinched their first win of the season. Winning pitcher was R. Inglis.

A final score of 8-7 reflected the cliff hanger game between Minnesota and Kansas. Minnesota were ahead a comfortable 7-3 in the second inning when Red Naporsen, shortstop for Kansas, hit a grand slam home run which put 4 runners across the plate to close the lead and changed the picture completely. Kansas pitchers held Minnesota off the scoreboard in the final innings. Dave Carter ran in the tying score for Kansas off a walk, and then Ramsay Hay completed the winning run from a single. Pitchers Frank Anderson for Minnesota, John Spring and Dave Whiting for Kansas shared honours for a close game which saw a total of only 9 hits.

In the National League, the Pittsburgh Pirates beat Mil-

waukee 4-1, the Braves only run coming from a homer by Keith Gillie. Pitcher Mike Toy helped the Cardinals to a 10-6 win over the Dodgers, giving up only 5 walks in the 6th inning game. Giants pulled off their first win of the season with a lopsided 11-4 victory over the Cincinnati Reds. Winning pitcher Al Whitman gave up only one run in the last five innings and went on to record two consecutive strike-outs.

Georgetown Minor Baseball

1962 RULES & REGULATIONS

All official baseball rules to apply with the following exceptions:

- Before the start of each game the coach of each competing team will prepare a batting order consisting of all players present. Late arrivals must be immediately added to the bottom end of the batting order.
- When a team is at bat ALL players, whether bench warmers or not, will bat in order (including Playoffs).
- Coaches should see to it that all players participate

for some portion of each game as batters. (Not Adults)

Coaches and Managers are to direct play from the bench and at no time during the game are to question the decision of the umpire. The Coaches should encourage the players not to question "The Calls" of the umpires. Coaches and managers may act as first base and third base coaches.

At no time may participating players or Coaches stand behind the backstop screen.

All games to start on time as scheduled 6:15 — deadline 8:45. To avoid forfeiture a team may borrow a player from the opposition if necessary.

Wins will be scored at two points. Ties as one point. No game shall be longer than six full innings. However, no full inning should start after 8:15. The ending a game by darkness or other natural elements is left to the discretion of the Umpire and the reverting to even innings will be governed by official rules. Curfew for all games will be 8:30 with no exceptions.

Any game called after three even innings will require a replay if it has any bearing on league standings.

The use of Batting Helmets is mandatory.

No metal spikes to be worn.

PLAYING RULES

Atom Group
Atom players will run 60 feet.
Atom pitchers will throw 40 feet.

No base stealing permitted. No advance permitted on passed ball or missed third strike.

Advance is permitted when pitcher misses throw-back from catcher.

Atom players may lead off base.

Umpires will not call balks on pitchers.

Peewee Group
Peewee players will run 70 feet.
Peewee pitchers will throw 50 feet.

The remainder of the rules governing Atom Group will apply to the Peewee Group.

Bantam Group
Bantam players will run 75 feet.
Bantam pitchers will throw 55 feet.

All regular baseball rules apply to the Bantam Group.

The home team will occupy the third base side of the diamond.
