

Red Sox Win 5-1 In Sunday Tilt

Milton Red Sox treated the home leaders to a 5-1 win over Georgetown Intermediate in a Halton County Baseball League game in the county town Sunday.

Prime Rigo led his mates to the win with 3 hits and 3 trips, and came home with the first run of the ball game in the hectic first inning when Milton pushed 3 runs across the plate with just one hit. Shannon and Glen Davis followed Rigo, taking advantage of two big Georgetown batters. Colley scored in the third with number 4 on Beaudreau's single, the 5th Milton counter came in the 7th when Theo Charlton, hit safely, stole second and scored on Phillip's line drive. Milton hit safely in every inning but the 6th.

Trouble Scoring
Georgetown batters got to Milton pitching twice in the initial frame but failed to produce a single run until the 8th when they ended a 4-inning famine with Jim James' single that enabled Stafford to romp home. Blake Thigls straggled in the last frame but the rally didn't materialize.

Glen Gibbs went all the way for town, and Hill pitched the full nine innings for the Red Sox.

Saturday the Georgetown crew was lashed 12 to 3 by Oakville in their first meeting here.

Eight Run Frame
Jim McGill started for Georgetown and lasted until the middle of the disastrous 4th

inning when Oak bats boomed in eight runs in a six-hit barrage. Dora was the reliever called on by manager Lyn McLaren, and he finished out the remaining 5 1/2 frames, giving up another run in the 8th and two in the 7th. The Oaks scored their first run in the first inning.

Georgetown threatened to break out several times before they got on the sheet. Three hits in the 6th inning yielded nothing and two hits in the 8th failed to produce a run. It was a pair of doubles by Don McLaughlin and Doug Richardson in the 7th that finally spoiled pitcher Hughes' bid for a shut-out. Stafford's hit in the 8th brought Dourette and Legge around with runs 2 and 3.

Struck Out Nine
In registering the win, Lyn McLaren struck out nine Red Sox and allowed no one first base on balls in fact, neither of Milton's two runs were earned. They came in the 3rd inning when Glen Davis and Prime Rigo scored an error by the shortstop and second sacker with one out.

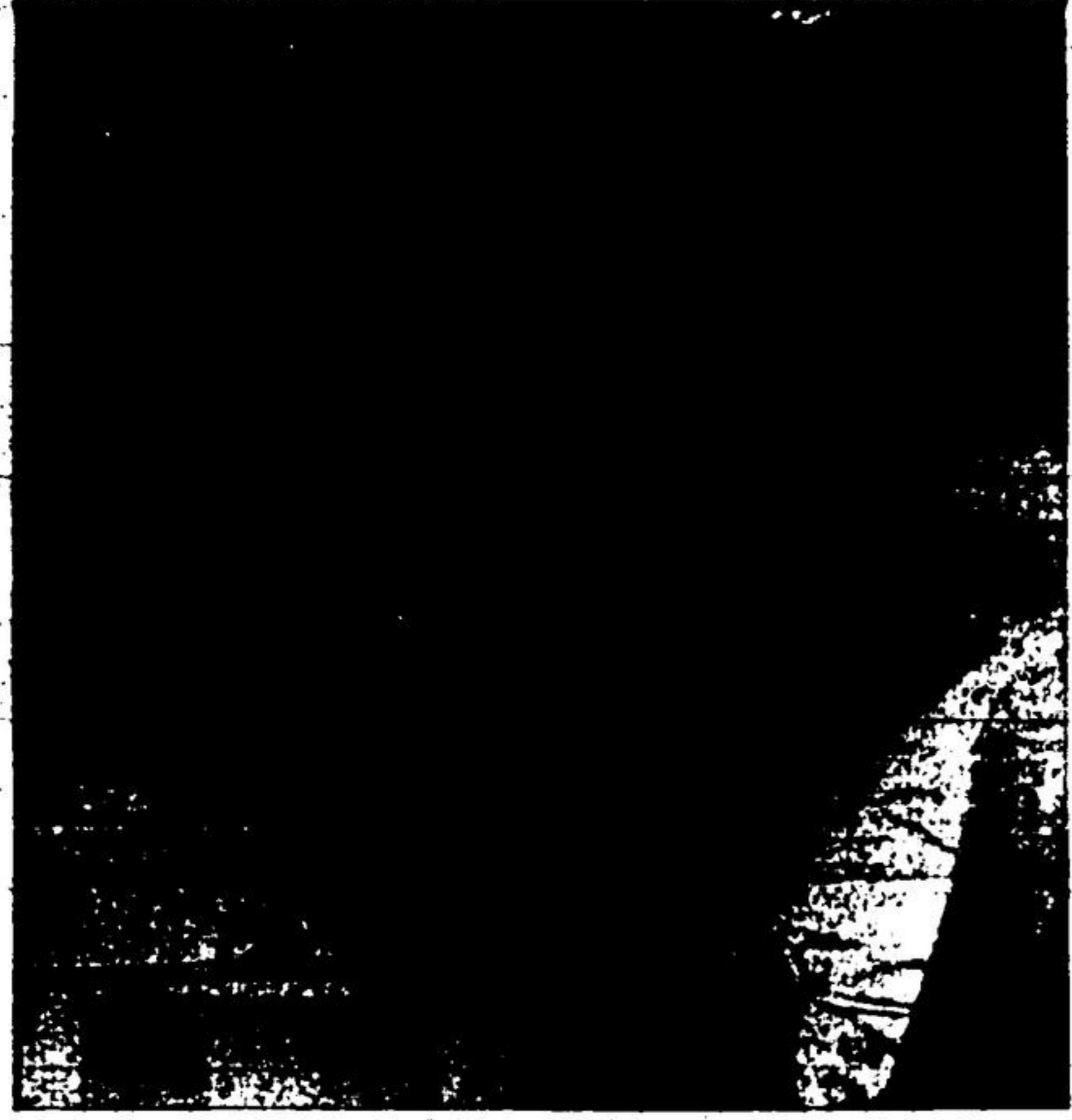

Weed Control News

3 4 D KILLS WEEDS — NOT LIVESTOCK

I am NOT AWARE of any cases where LIVESTOCK have been POISONED with 2 4-D in this area. It is SURPRISING though to know that a member of residents WILL NOT USE this chemical because of the FEAR of poisoning to cattle and other animals. Since farmers, highway and municipal authorities are using 2 4-D WEED KILLER so extensively, this article is intended to DISSEMINATE some of the DOUBT regarding the SAFETY to animals.

Livestock owners in the U.S.A. have been QUICK TO BLAME 2 4-D when their animals developed ILLNESSES with NO APPARENT CAUSE. These complaints have prompted action by the OHIO STATE DIAGNOSTIC LABORATORY, who have conducted an extensive POST MORTEM research program on animals which farmers had believed to have been killed by 2 4-D poisoning.

Special experiments were set up using field RECOMMENDED CONCENTRATIONS of 2 4-D and 2 4 5-T (the so-called weed sprays). The following information was sent to me from the O.A.C. at Guelph.

FIRST TEST

PASTURE CONTAMINATION. Recommended rates of 2 4-D and 2 4 5-T were applied to PASTURE PLOTS and two cows were turned in. There were NO ILL EFFECTS. Pastures were sprayed again with DOUBLE the recommended rates. Six sheep were turned in, but NO ILL EFFECTS were observed. The pastures were sprayed with FOUR TIMES the recommended rates. No ill effects were observed on FOUR PIGS which were turned in the pasture. Researchers concluded 2 4-D and 2 4 5-T spray on vegetation DOES NOT CAUSE visible toxic effects on cattle, sheep or swine.

SECOND TEST

SPRAY ON SKIN. Researchers SPRAYED A CALF with 1 pint of 2 4-D at the recommended level. No ill effects were observed. They applied two quarts of spray to the calf with NO ILL EFFECTS. They sprayed a cow with 1 gallon 2 4-D, 2 4 5-T mixture with no ill effects. They sprayed a SHEEP with a quart of this mixture, then DOUBLED the rate, with no ill effects. This experiment was REPEATED on sows and young pigs. Conclusions were that 2 4-D and 2 4 5-T sprayed on skin of cattle, sheep or swine caused no visible toxic effects.

THIRD TEST

CHRONIC EXPOSURE. Hay fed to the animals was sprayed TWICE A DAY with 2 4-D and 2 4 5-T for 41 DAYS. The animals showed NO VISIBLE toxic effects at the end of the period.

FOURTH TEST

ATTRACTIVE PROPERTIES OF CHEMICALS. A pasture containing both areas of WEEDS AND BLUEGRASS was set up and sprayed. After close observation, researchers

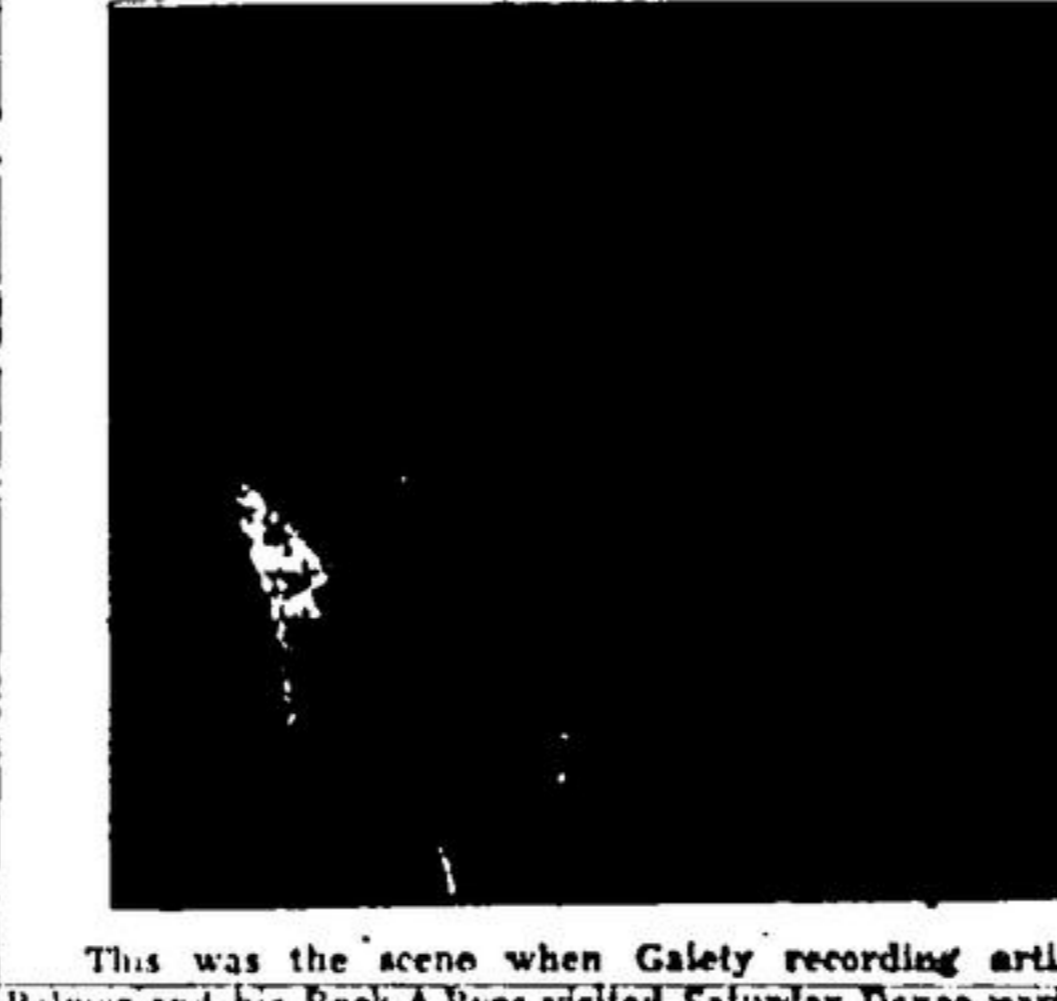

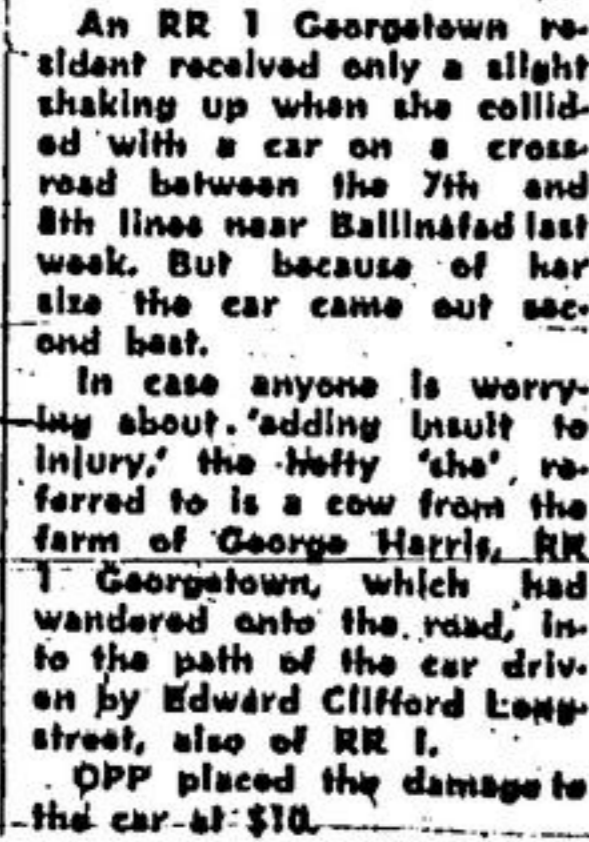
CAR EMERGES SECOND BEST
