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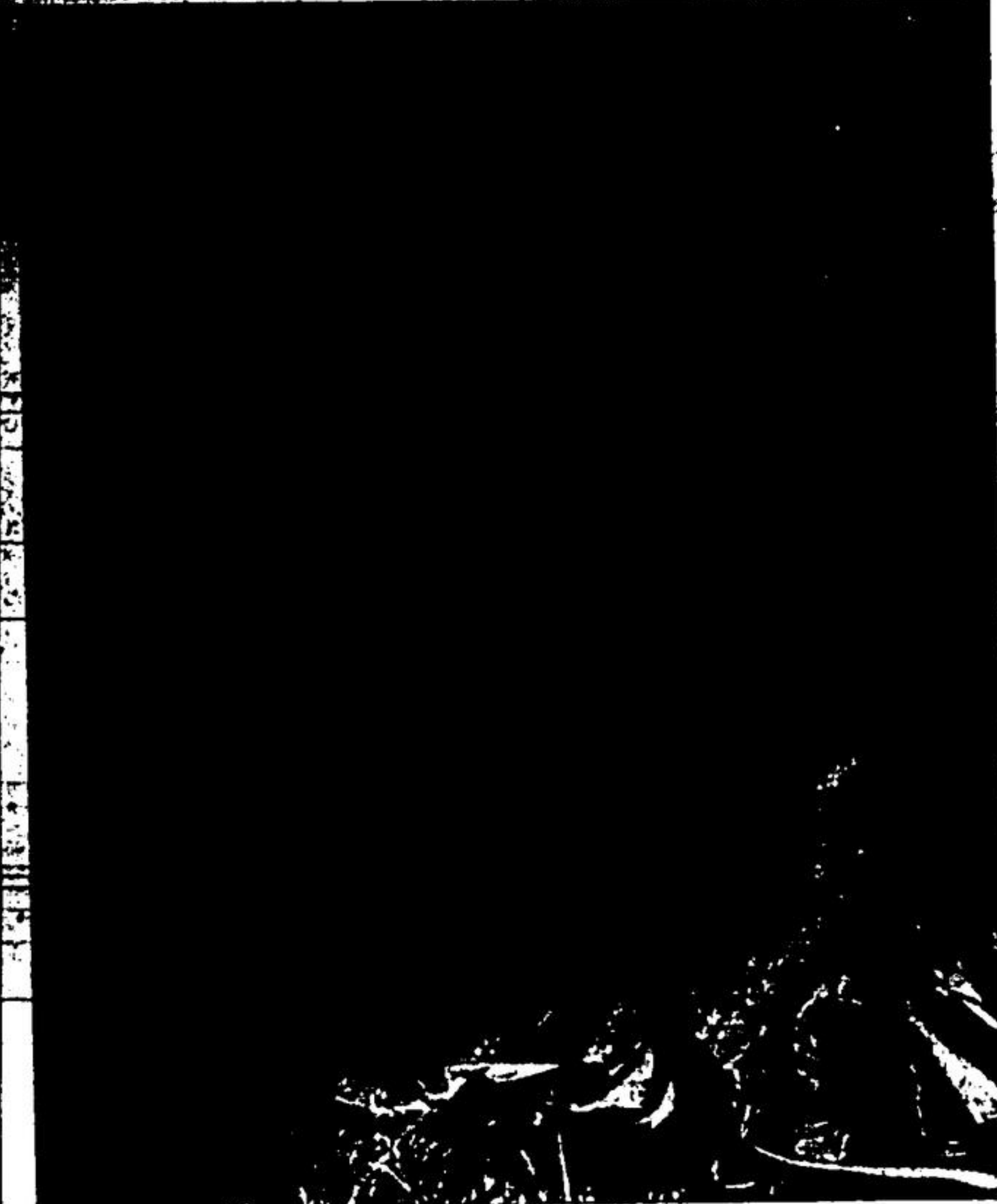

Solve Differences At County Building

Last week's marked difference of opinion at County Council regarding changes to the new Administration Building, were resolved peacefully at a special meeting Tuesday. The Administration area will be left as originally planned, except a proposed partition will not be constructed. As an economy measure, furnishings in the kitchen area and staff room will be cut to a minimum. A saving of \$3,500 will be effected by the deletion of rugs in many areas.

COUNTY COUNCIL BRIEFS

- Hopes of Halton hunters were dashed when County Council refused to permit a deer hunting season again this year. Despite the fact Burlington council gave permission to hold a hunt north of highway No. 5, the recommendation of the County Agriculture Committee was accepted by County Council. No reason was given.
- Over the counter sale of County Debentures will come into effect in August. Finance Chairman Rovee C. A. Martin of Milton announced at County Council. \$118,000 of county debentures will be offered locally through advertisements in the county newspapers.
- A grant of \$4300 was authorized for the North Halton Association for Retarded Children's new school at Hornby. The \$40,000 structure should be completed by July.
- The amount of the grant is based on the County by-law which allows \$1.50 per sq. ft. of building.
