



Inquest Continues in Jakobsen Fire Death

Blood samples taken from the body of Neil (Nels) Jakobsen found May 21 in the charred basement of 13 Prince Charles Drive, revealed 45% carbon monoxide saturation and 1.3 parts per thousand alcohol, it was disclosed at the coroner's inquest held Tuesday in Milton.

The inquest was presided over by Coroner J. E. Chamberlain, assisted by Supervising Coroner of Ontario, J. Colman. The five man jury consisted of Ken Nash, Arthur Spaight, Ted Arnold, Claude Kentner, and Bill Anderson, all from Georgetown.

Dr. F. W. MacDonnell, regional pathologist, explained that a saturation of over 35% carbon monoxide would probably be fatal. In reply to a question from Crown Attorney Peter Williams, he said alcohol in the bloodstream works along with the carbon monoxide. He assumed the origin of the carbon monoxide was the smoke.

Dr. R. C. Gupta, an expert on poisons, confirmed Dr. MacDonnell's findings. "The blood contained 45.1% saturation of carbon monoxide, a level judged to be lethal," he opined.

Miss Rita Charlebois, chemist with the Attorney General's laboratory, who tested the blood for alcohol content, stated the 1.3 parts per thousand was equivalent to 5 1/2 pints of beer, or 8 oz. of liquor in a man of 185 lbs. (the approximate weight of Jakobsen).

During Tuesday's session six witnesses were called. One of them, Mrs. J. Martinuk, 4011 St. St., at whose house Nels Jakobsen boarded for over a year, testified that on two occasions the deceased had caused fires in his bedroom, by careless smoking. Replying to the Crown Attorney, Mrs. Martinuk admitted that on both occasions he had been drinking.

Most of the witnesses told of the events of the night of the fire, including the activities of Douglas Jennings, and Mr. Jakobson.

A chemist with the Attorney General's Laboratory, Frank Lucas confirmed the findings of Inspector Simmons that there were two separate concentrations of fire in the apartment. The inquest is continuing.
