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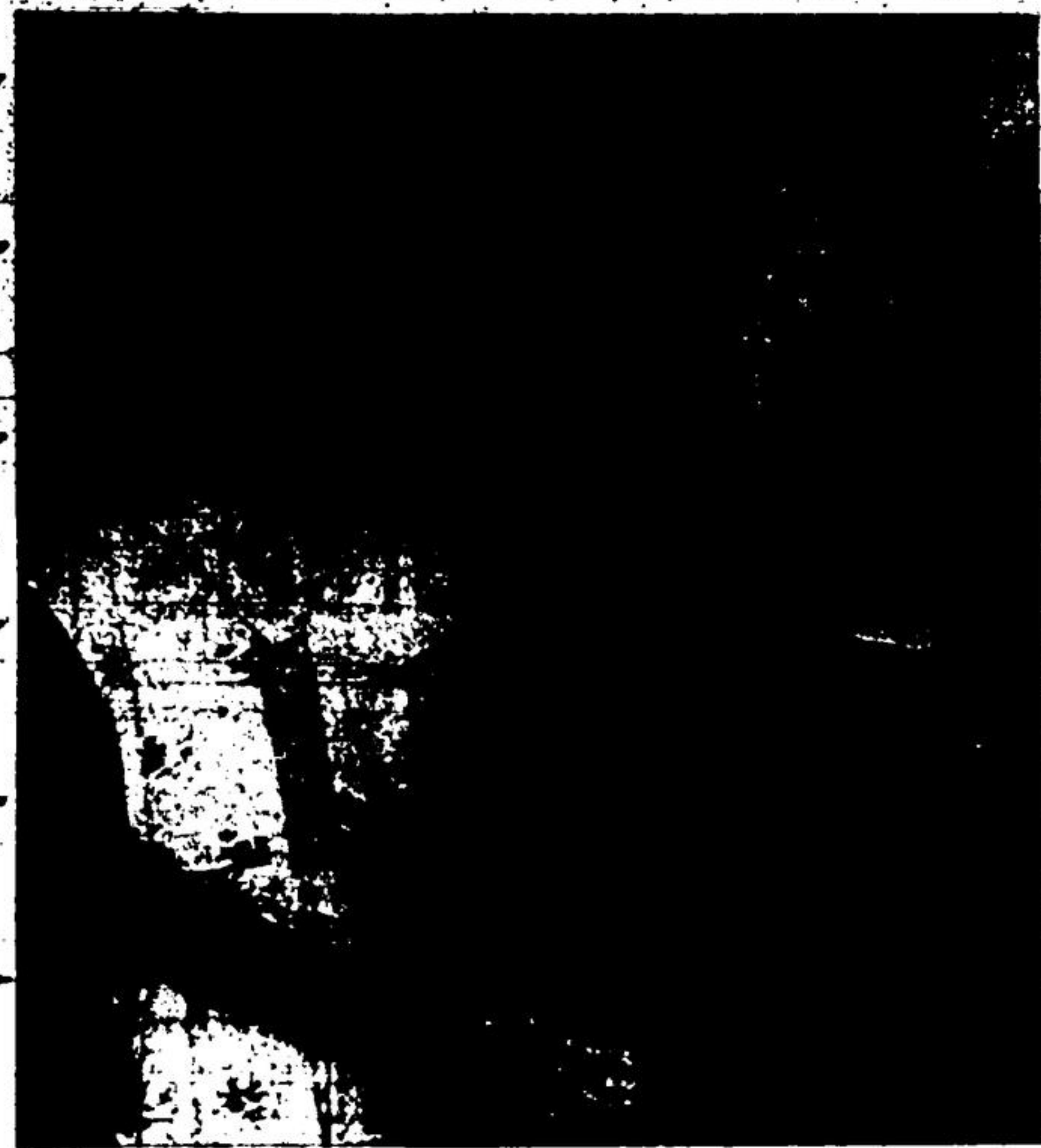

### Will Demonstrate Fireproof Product

Tonight (July 5th) at 7:00 p.m. the public is invited to see a demonstration of the fire hall of a new fire-resistant product which, if it lives up to expectations, will be a valuable aid to fire prevention.

The product is a powder which, when mixed with water, can be sprayed on clothing and on building products.

Fire Chief Bob Bonfield saw a demonstration recently in Milton when a company representative showed the product to members of the county fire prevention bureau. He was impressed and has agreed to have it demonstrated also to the local fire department and is inviting the public to see it also.

The product is non-toxic and odorless. It can be sprayed on certain building products such as acoustic tile, on mattresses, chesters, fields and clothing. It will not protect plastic materials and will not last through a washing, but will through three dry cleanings. The advantages are obvious.

Spraying of certain building products could substantially cut fire hazards in homes. And the product could be particularly valuable in reducing fires in mattresses and chesters which account for heavy property damage and often loss of life in fires.

Tonight's demonstration will take place at or near the fire hall and an invitation is extended to anyone interested to attend.
