Dr. Harry Harley of Oakville is officially the of perhament for Halton riding.

A recount of the vote cast in the federal election in Halton was conducted before Judge Elliott, at the court house in Milton on Saturday, June 30th, and indicated no change in previous standings between Dr. Harley and Sandy Best, the incumbent who led by 61 votes before the services ballots swept Dr. Harley into a 98 vote lead.

Sandy Best called off a complete recount after a sample count showed little deviation from the actual poll count. About 470 ballots were invalid according to the election act and were ineligible for consideration.

Dr. Harley's victory puts Halton County out of the government for the first time in five years.
