# Athenian System Merits That the need for altering county boundaries was evident, Study by Canadians

### City-State Concept Outlined by Planner

The Greeks had a word for it, "city-state" and Dr. H B the Credit Valley Conservation! Mayo, professor of political science at Western University, Authority was organizer of the Dorothy Richardson Scull, and advocated a return to the Athenian system at the wind-up-complete Workshop session of the Regional Planning Workshop last week here in Georgetown. His topic was "Planning relationships between Dinner, Show

Dr. Mayo's concept of a "city state" envisioned a uniting of a city and a wide area of surrounding country into one political unit. Directly elected rural members, possibly from wards and townships would make up a portion of the new "city-country" or "regional council." Under this scheme, separated towns or cities would be a thing of the past.

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
