Dinner, Show Safety Patrol

Last week twenty three members of the School Safety Patrol, accompanied by Harrison School principal Harry Knapper, teachers Bruce Mackison, and Glenn Emerson and Constable Ted Scott, were treated to dinner at the Pickett Restaurant, and a cinema show at the Eglinton theatre. The children saw South Pacific Adventure.

Since the Patrol's inception six years ago at Harrison School no child has been in an accident while the patrol has been on duty. This year saw the start of a patrol at Park School. Another first, this year, was the inclusion of girls in the group. Constable Scott who has been largely responsible for the Safety programme among school children, proudly boasts that in the six years since its inception, the accident rate has dropped from a high of twelve to a high of two, in any one year. Making the record more noteworthy is the fact there were only two public schools six years ago, and now there are six.

During the past year only one boy has been involved in an accident during the school term, and that was well away from school. In the fall all the schools except Harrison, will receive a safety plaque. An interesting by-product of the Safety Patrol is the quality of leadership developed, according to findings at a recent Traffic Conference. In addition, it was discovered many ex-patrol members go into police work. A word of warning to motorists was given by Constable Scott. With the children out of school and bent on having a good time, he says it's up to the motorists to remember their carefree vacation days, and watch out for the children.

Athenian System Merits Study by Canadians

City-State Concept Outlined by Planner

The Greeks had a word for it, "city-state" and Dr. H. B. Mayo, professor of political science at Western University, advocated a return to the Athenian system at the wind-up session of the Regional Planning Workshop last week here in Georgetown. His topic was "Planning relationships between Local Municipalities and the Province."

Dr. Mayo's concept of a "city-state" envisioned a uniting of a city and a wide area of surrounding country into one political unit. Directly elected rural members, possibly from wards and townships would make up a portion of the new "city-country" or "regional council." Under this scheme, separated towns or cities would be a thing of the past.

No Barrier. The speaker claimed that the automobile and modern highways had erased the "invisible barrier" between town and country. Consequently rural areas have as high a stake in joint action or joint government as a town or city. This joint government could well be the logical outcome of joint or regional planning.

With a smile in the direction of Hon. F. M. Case, Minister of Municipal Affairs, who sat near him, he stated, "To say as many political leaders do that planning is a local responsibility is in effect to say there will be no planning at all. This attitude," he continued, "is an abdication of political leadership and an evasion of the province's constitutional duty."

Central City. While obviously favouring a system of local government which would change existing boundaries, he listed other methods of regional planning which would leave them intact. First he suggested a central city could be designated to plan for a specific area around it, such as in Metro Toronto. However, he felt the city would be looked on as a dictator by all other local authorities.

Next, he mentioned a system of voluntary co-operation such as we have now. "However, before we get effective joint planning this way, pigs will fly," was his wry comment. He felt a system of county planning might be made to work, providing the planning area is all in one county. Since most regions are not all within a county, the question of co-operation between counties would still arise. (This solution was worthy of investigation, according to Dr. Mayo).

Strong Leadership. A planning area designed by the Province was his last recommendation. The Official Plan when adopted, would be given precedence over any relevant by-law of any municipality. He noted this would demand strong leadership. The biggest problem here would be enforcement. Dr. Mayo felt planning unity is inextricably bound up with political-unity of some kind, and thus his idea of a "city-state." While a few of the elected officials present shuddered, he continued the view that the

labour pool and its market. That the need for altering county boundaries was evident, but support for these changes would be hard to win. 4. That the Province should give more direct leadership in the field of planning. Former mayor, E. T. Hyde, a member of the Georgetown Planning Board, chaired the meeting and Alex MacLaren of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority was organizer of the complete workshop.
