Safety Council Offers Assistance to Farmers

The Halton Farm Safety Council offers the following assistance to Farm Organizations in Halton, to encourage Farm Safety:
1. FARM SAFETY QUIZ
Safety Quiz sheets, one copy of correct answers, and 3 prizes are available at no charge to Rural organizations in Halton. There are four sets of quiz sheets to choose from:
Number 1 — General
Number 2 — Household and General
Number 3 — Rural Safe Driving
Number 4 — General
2. SAFETY FLAGS FOR TRACTOR
This is part of the Provincial campaign to promote highway safety with farm operators moving slow equipment on highways. The Council will provide a safety flag complete with 6 ft. flexible steel pole and mounting bracket at a \$1.00 charge.
3. FARM SAFETY STANDARDS
These are suitable as continual reminders of farm accident hazards and suitable for placing in barns, houses, machine sheds and other areas on the farm. The Council is making available to each farm in Halton County, a set of these Farm Safety Standards.
4. SLIDE COMPETITION
This competition is open to one member from each farm in Halton County. As a competitor each contestant will submit six 2" x 2" coloured slides on Farm Safety. Rules and regulations are available from the Council. Entries close August 18th.
5. FILMS
Several films on Farm Safety are provided through the Halton Farm Safety Council. A request for a film shall be at least two weeks before the date of meeting.

Milton Reeve Would Amalgamate County
A municipal official in Halton county has proposed that all of Halton County's towns and townships amalgamate into one community under one government.
In rapid fire fashion Dr. C. A. Martin, Milton's reeve, suggested the amalgamation at a town council meeting last week.
The suggestion followed an announcement by Oakville councillor Frank Gallagher that he would ask an Oakville council committee to study amalgamation of Milton and Oakville.
All the boundary flurry has developed since Milton received its annexation report, the contents of which have not been revealed.
Reeve Martin pointed out that Milton's assessment of \$240,000,000 makes it one of the wealthiest in Ontario. He suggested it could be administered and operated more efficiently as a unit and serve as a buffer against encroachment of Hamilton and Toronto.

Stressing the feasibility of the county amalgamation the Reeve noted there were already county roads, health units, welfare services and schools under the county administration.
Reeve Martin suggested, however, that such a move should be taken quickly before other municipalities get over the borders. The first step would have to be by Oakville or Burlington, he concluded.

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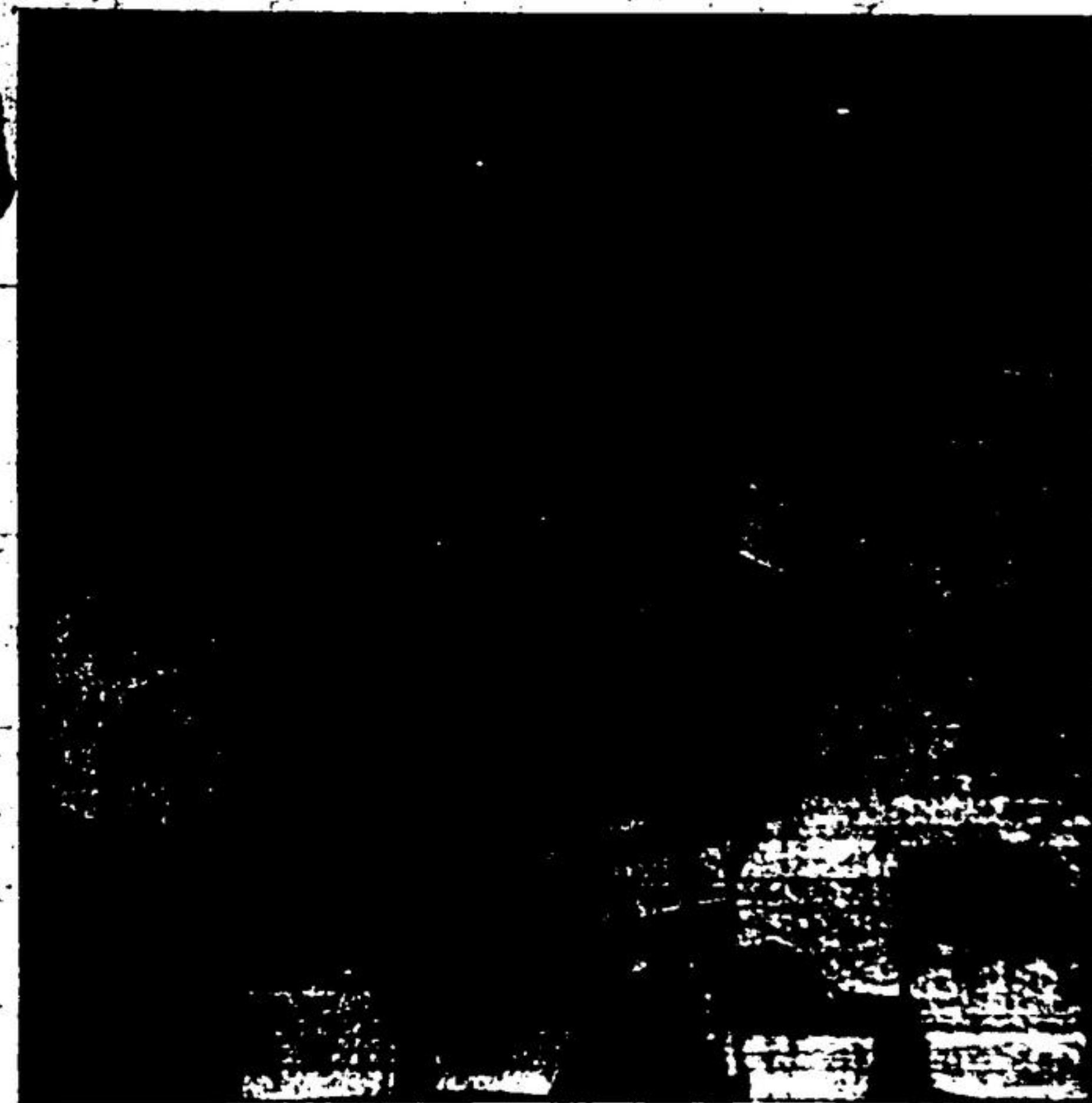
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THE ROADSIDE IS THEIR MARKET PLACE
