SALUTE TO VICTORIA

If you have never seen the sun set over the west coast of Vancouver Island, you have missed the gift God gave citizens of this part of Canada every twenty-four hours. Even when this glory is obscured by cloud, you instinctively know it is there. It is nature's daily curtain call for the burst of color I shall always associate with the gardens of Victoria and the surrounding lushly wooded areas of this island settled like a rare gem in the Pacific Ocean.

I saw it through mist shrouded first feathers against a weather of southern sky on a dawn evening in May as the last finger of light beckoned Harry McKeever, Public Information Officer for the government of British Columbia, and me, his passenger, along a winding road leading to Sooke, a little village that marks the end of pavement on the west coast. This was an Indian trail and the B.C. government has followed the natural route our first citizens wore bare in the forests of this island.

I am always fortunate in my journeying, for the mist part of the way is a shower me with information about their respective areas. Such a one is Harry McKeever. One needs a sense of humor to tolerate the curiosity of this touring vagabond and his soluble grandson.

Book Lorne Scots For Niagara Camp

NIAGARA — ON THE LAKE — Historic Camp Niagara will be holding a parade with military activity as forty six units of the Canadian Army Militia, including the Lorne Scots, totaling about 4,800 men, representing four Militia Groups in Central Ontario, attend the annual one week camp during the month of July.

Some 1,200 militiamen from Toronto's 14th Militia Group, commanded by Brig. F. B. West, will lead the peaceful invasion as they move into camp on Saturday June 30. They will be followed on July 7 by the 16th Militia Group from Northern Ontario, commanded by Brig. J. F. Westhead.

Units of the 15th Militia Group from Toronto and Ottawa, commanded by Brig. J. N. Gordon, will be arriving on July 14th for the third week of camp. Hamilton and Niagara Peninsula units of the 17th Militia Group, commanded by Brig. G. A. Henderson, will attend camp during the final week from 21 to 28 July.

Throughout all units will live under canvas and will undertake a week of intensive field training in both conventional and national survival roles. All militiamen will undergo some national survival training, applying the basic rescue skills learned during the winter months.

Armoured units will train with Sherman tanks, while the field and medium artillery will use 105mm and 155mm guns, respectively.

Weapon Training
Bailey bridge construction and fresh water supply operations will be carried out by units of the Royal Canadian Engineers. Weapon training for infantrymen will include the use of 81mm mortars, 30 cal. machine guns, 75mm recoilless rifles and 3.5 rocket launchers. Signal Corps and Service units will receive functional training by carrying out their normal role in running the camp by supply rations, transport, issuing equipment and providing communications and many other services.

The Instructional Staff for Central Ontario Area will conduct special courses for First Aid Instructors, Range Safety Officers, Radiation Monitoring, Senior NCOs and the operation of the C42 Radio Set.

Exercise June Bug
During the first two days of each week, unit signallers will receive the operation of the C42 radio set and the latest army radio message procedure. This training will culminate in EXERCISE JUNE BUG, a three-hour radio exercise to be conducted each Wednesday. It will practice communication personnel of the various headquarters on C42 radio set operation and familiarize officers at each headquarters with the procedure for passing messages and information during national survival operations.
