

Anglers, Hunters Buy 8th Line Farm Property

New Clubhouse in Planning Stage

The Georgetown Anglers and Hunters have taken steps to complete a plan that has been in the talking stage for some time. On June 29th the club closed a deal to purchase a 50 acre farm on the 8th Line, one mile north of the Ballinastid road, and plans are currently under way for the early construction of a large new clubhouse which will be located on the side of a hill overlooking a considerable section of the property. The new clubhouse will be of two story construction with all modern conveniences.

The Anglers and Hunters have listed the following projects to be included in the building scheme:

1. Enlargement of one of the three existing spring ponds and construction of a fourth of equal size. One pond will be used for swimming with a small sand beach for children.
2. Construction of a new trap range to Amateur Trap Shooting Association standards for regular and regulated shooting.
3. Provision of areas and development for archery, small and large bore rifle and target shooting.
4. Provision of areas for picnics and campings.
5. Re-forestation on property boundaries and lower levels.
6. An inside small bore rifle and handgun range will be located in the clubhouse basement for all-weather shooting.

The present club property near Hickory Falls has been sold. This property was purchased ten years ago and the cedar logs on the property were cut to build the clubhouse.

Share Services of Brampton Y Man

The new Georgetown YMCA YWCA has received a boost from Brampton.

Arrangements have been made to share the services of Brampton Y director Eric Eason on a part-time basis. He will contribute a day a week during August and two days a week in succeeding months in directing the local program.

Details are still being discussed by the board's program committee.

First activity — a day camp, directed by Mrs. Jim Billebarrow, is taking place at Terra Cotta Conservation area on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. The group will

be taken by bus from St. George's Church, each morning at 9:30 and leave Terra Cotta at 4:30 p.m. Crafts, swimming and a nature hike are part of the program. A number of counsellors are assisting Mrs. Billebarrow. If rules interfere, the facilities of Cedarvale School have been offered as a substitute.
