He was a passenger in Mr. Wilson's sports car, which collided with another vehicle at the intersection of the 5th Line and Stewarttown sideroad.

Moving Same Week
Terry was to have moved on Saturday that week to Los Angeles, California, where his father, Fred had already gone to start a new job. The family had lived at 17 Mary St. since moving to town from Scarborough seven years ago. Prior to that they had lived in Montreal and in Ottawa where Terry was born.

A Grade 9 pupil at Georgetown High School, he had previously attended Holy Cross Separate School and before that school opened was a pupil at Chapel St. Public School.

Patrol Leader
Active in scouts, he was a patrol leader with 5th Georgetown Scouts where his father was chairman of the group committee. He was a member of the Catholic Youth Organization and had worked Saturdays at the IGA Store. He leaves his parents and a sister, Sandra.

Father Otter officiated at the funeral mass and six of his close friends were pallbearers, Frank Volk, Keith Vivian, Roy Vinnall, Gary Pullerton, Neil Tait and Steve Murray. A group of scouts from 1st and 5th Georgetown formed a guard of honour at the church burial which was in Greenwood Cemetery.

Three Injured in Ashgrove Accident

Two RR 2 people are in the Georgetown hospital with multiple injuries suffered in a two-car collision at the intersection of the 7th line and the sideroad at Ashgrove last Wednesday night.

Karen Bridgen and her mother Mrs. M. Bridgen were rushed to hospital by Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service. Karen was treated for a compound fracture of the left leg, and a fractured jaw, and Mrs. Bridgen, internal injuries, a broken arm, broken jaw and shock. The driver of the other car, Stanco Giurissich of Milton, received facial lacerations.

An OPP report said the damage to the 1961 Valiant driven by Karen Bridgen and the 1960 Ford driven by Giurissich totalled \$1800.

Cat. Dave Richardson of the county detachment OPP at Milton investigated. The accident occurred at 9 p.m.
