## Carbon Monoxide Ruled Jakobsen Death Cause

apartment after Jennings had filed the burning apartment. They theorized that Jakobsen would prevent any of this testimony being used against him. They should the occasion arise, Jennings stated he last saw Jakobson going up the stairs to the outside door.

When asked by a juryman what weight should be given to Jennings' confession, Dr. H. E. Stokes, psychiatrist with the forensic clinic said, "Alcohol and carbon monoxide were totally unsuitable for use in the Suchan basement quarters. The Inspector said they themselves send out a lethal gas."

Much other evidence of Jennings' "fall tale telling" was given by his mother, father, wife and Constable Lowe. The mother told of receiving flow-ers at the door from her son's fellow workers only to find of Ken Nash, Arthur Spight, they were for her funeral. Her son had told a story of her and Bill Anderson, in addition death. His wife told of an alleged accident where her husband's friend was killed only to have him turn up very much alive. "No," replied the doctor, "I don't think he could fool all of us."

Inspector Kenneth Grice of the Criminal Investigation Department, pointed out the inconsistencies between the evidence and the now-denied statement.

In reply to a question from Chief Coroner J.
