ESQUEWING COUNCIL

Seeker Enforcement of Trailer Fee By-Law

"Either we ask the Provincial Police to enforce our by-law, or we should hire someone to do it," said Clerk K. C. Lindsay at the Esquewing township council meeting this week. The remark came out of a discussion on the question of trailer licenses. Building Inspector William Halls told council some pay the fee and others don't. Councillor Walter Linkman opined, "It's not fair that one pays and another doesn't."

Council decided to ask the Provincial Police about the question, since they felt that "there's no use enforcing by-law if you can't enforce them."

During June a total value of \$64,500 in building permits was issued in the Township of Esquewing. This was all residential development.

Some confusion developed when Mr. J. Kreppel asked permission to build a service station, restaurant and apartment on Highway 25 near the 401 cloverleaf. By adding an apartment, theoretically the building becomes a residence, and as such he cannot separate the one front acre from the remaining nine acres without paying the \$300 separation fee. However, the question arose if you separate from yourself since he owns the whole ten acres, do you still pay a fee. The question will be ironed out at a meeting of the Planning Board next week.

Neilson Stark, a poultry and cattle evaluator for Esquewing, told of forty-one hens belonging to E. A. Berg, Limehouse, being destroyed by a dog. Mr. Berg was reimbursed eighty-one dollars for his hens, and in addition paid five dollars for shooting the dog. Referring to the five dollars, Coun. George Leslie remarked, "It's money well spent."

Requisitions from both the Acton and Georgetown District High School Boards for a share of their 1962 levy from the municipality, raised the question "Does a municipality have to pay requisitions to Boards and Authorities before their own taxes are collected?" Summing up the whole financing structure briefly, Coun. George Leslie remarked, "They might as well borrow as us."

Clerk K. C. Lindsay felt they sold to the Duplate company.

Founded Local Industry Barnet Stone, 82, Dies

A man who gave his name to one of Georgetown's major industries died at the Wellesley Hospital, Toronto on June 23rd following a lengthy illness. Barnet (Benny) Stone, 82, established Smith & Stone Ltd. in Georgetown in 1919. His death followed by only a few weeks that of Wilfrid Ford, retired sales manager of the firm, who was one of the early employees. Born in Russia and orphaned at an early age, Mr. Stone went to England as a youth and came to Canada in 1902, first living at Kingston and later in Toronto. The firm which he established here to manufacture electrical porcelain products had a steady growth in both product variety and employment. Several local friends attended the funeral service on June 24th at Beth Tzedec Synagogue. Interment was in Beth Tzedec Memorial Park.
