



Qualified Assistant Joins Staff of C.A.

Hilton Children's Aid Society recently named an executive assistant to the director, and he has taken over his duties at the Milton headquarters. He is Bill James, who holds a B.A. and Master's Degree in social work.

A native of St. John's Newfoundland, he spent nearly all his life in Ontario. He received his B.A. at Victoria College, Toronto, then went on to earn the Master's Degree in social work at the University of Toronto School of Social Work, graduating in 1959.

Perth Director

He served with Toronto Children's Aid one year, then went to do social work with Perth County C.A.S. at Stratford for four years. From 1965 to 1969, he was director at Stratford, then he headed south to take a seminar short course in social work at York College, Northampton, Mass., before going on to Pittsburgh to gain experience in family children's service and counselling.

Adult Counselling

He served four years as an air bomber with the R.C.A.F. during the Second World War, and part of the time was attached to an R.A.F. squadron overseas.

Mr. James is married and has two daughters, aged six and eight. The family has moved to 1555-15th St., Milton.

In Milton, his work will be chiefly with married parents and counselling for adults, leaving C.A.S. director J. Paul Joffe freed for the child care and administration end of the work.

New President For Standard Products

Directors of The Standard Products Company have elected James S. Reid, Jr. to succeed F. R. Vahey as president. Mr. Reid has been executive vice president and Mr. Vahey is retiring after a 22 year career with the Cleveland automotive and building products company.

W. Howard Thornbury, senior vice president of the company and head of its Detroit sales office, was elected a director to replace Mr. Vahey on the company's board.

The directors also declared a year-end dividend of 10 cents a share and advanced payment of the quarterly dividend of 10 cents a share by one month in recognition of "an improvement in current earnings and in the business outlook."

Both dividends will be paid on July 20 to shareholders of record as of July 10. Previous dividends of 10 cents a share each were paid on February 20 and May 21, and it is anticipated that dividends will be maintained on a quarterly basis beginning with the July 20 payment.

Mr. Reid said earnings for the fiscal year ending June 30 are expected to equal or exceed the previous estimate of \$110 a share compared with a loss of 15 cents a share for the preceding year.

Mr. Vahey who is retiring after a 47 year career in the automotive business, is one of the industry's pioneers.

He worked for the National Cash Register Company from 1908 to 1914, and was a sales representative under Thomas J. Watson there before Mr. Watson founded IBM. Mr. Vahey was successively a factory representative for Willys Overland sales manager of the Graham Brothers Truck Company, sales manager of the Dodge Brothers Truck Division and assistant general sales manager of Graham Paige Motors Corp.

He joined Standard Products in 1940 as manager of military sales becoming secretary of the corporation and manager of the Post-City, Ohio, Division in 1942, and vice president and general manager in 1944. He

has served as president since 1958.

Mr. Reid, Jr. has been executive vice president and director of the company for the past two years. He previously served as manager of its West Coast Division and as director of industrial relations.

He was graduated from Harvard in 1948, with honors, following service in the Air Force. He received a degree from the Harvard Law School in 1951, and spent four years as a practicing attorney in Michigan and Ohio before joining Standard Products.

Mr. Reid, Jr. is the son of James S. Reid, founder and chairman of Standard Products.
